NEW RULES FOR ALL GAS BOOKS

New regulations and new rules have been set up by O. P. A. for holders of A, B, and C gasoline books and coupons, and War Price and Ration boards have been given strict instructions to see that the new rules are carried out by individual holders of the coupons.

The new rules do not make it any harder for the owners, but it will materially help service station operators in giving service to their customers. Your service station manager does not like to have to tell you that you are violating the rules, and you should not, when the rules are very simple. So we all should become familiar with the rules and help our friends at the service stations.

When you get your new A coupons, write your license plate No. and state on every coupon. Do that as soon as you get your coupons. It will only take a very few minutes and you will be saved considerable annoyance. Do the same thing on your new B and C coupons. Do not give the number of your state stamp, but give the number of the license plate on your car and the state of origin, like Ore., Calif., or Wash.

The new rule O. P. A. is going to insist upon, and also don't forget to sign your name on the line so designated and address. Let's make it unanimous and get better service.

KEEP FORESTS GREEN — HELP DEFEAT THE JAPS

"We're figuring on giving Jupiter Pluvius a 720-hour honor badge for the 30 days extra he worked for Keep Oregon Green this summer," said Kenneth Martin, Josephine county chairman of the publicly sponsored forest fire prevention organization of Keep Oregon Green in commenting on the very favorable fire weather for Oregon this summer.

"A great many Oregonians now imagine their job has been pretty well done for them," the KOG county chairman observed, "just because the rains have been very liberally and unusually spread out through all of June and July. The fact is that the public's job on fire prevention the balance of the summer will be more difficult than ever. The extra heavy rainfall has created lush grass and fern growth throughout the state, and when the hot winds of late July and August dry them up, the fuel for fire will be heavy and plentiful."

The next 70 days will be critical ones on the forest fire front, State Forester Nelson Rogers pointed out in a statement calling upon the people of the state to give every possible assistance to keep man-caused fires at the very minimum the rest of the summer. The very splendid offers of support to Keep Oregon Green from every county in Oregon indicate the desire and intention of the public to maintain the excellent record made in the past two years since inception of the state-wide Keep Oregon Green movement, Forester Rogers continued.

"The best way for you to Slap a Jap is to make sure your match, cigarette and campfire are not allowed to go out unescorted," the county chairman concluded.

STORM STARTS TWO FOREST FIRES HERE

Two forest fires, which were minor in character and not giving the fire fighters much trouble developed in the Page Creek district this week, occasioned by lightning.

One was on the summit trail above the Oregon Caves and the other was on Squaw Mountain. In addition to the regular fire fighting crew stationed at the Redwood Ranger station in Cave Junction, the force was augmented with the blister rust crew stationed at the old Oregon Caves CCC camp.

The rain accompanying the storm today (Thursday) will materially help in putting out any new fires that may develop with the lightning storm this morning.

Ranger Harold Bowerman has had his crew on their toes and the work accomplished with the forest fires to date has been complimented by his superiors.

AREAS CLOSED BY STATE GAME COMMISSION

In compliance with the request of the United States army, the Game Commission at its meeting on July 10 passed an order closing to all hunting the central Oregon area to be covered by army maneuvers this summer and fall.

The area affected takes in all of Deschutes county except a strip in the western part along the Cascade range, the southern part of Crook county, the boundary line running generally just north of Crooked river; a narrow strip in the southwestern corner of Grant county; the western part of Harney county, including the city of Burns; the northern half of Lake county, the tip of the southern boundary reaching Valley Falls and both Summer Lake and Lake Abert being within the closed area; and the northeastern portion of Klamath county just north of the Klamath Indian reservation.

This area will be closed to hunting only and fishing will be permitted. The order may be rescinded by the commission whenever the emergency ceases to exist and if the army maneuvers are discontinued sufficiently early, the commission then may consider the possibility of making adjustments in some of the seasons.

WHEAT AND RYE LESS; WEST IS SHORT ON HAY

Considering current crop conditions and carry-over, figures indicate approximately 100 million bushels less wheat and rye in the United States bread grain supply for the next marketing season than for the 1942-43 season, according to an analysis of crop prospects by the Oregon agricultural extension service. Even so, the bread grain supply will be near record proportions, enough for two years of normal domestic consumption.

The supply of feed grains may be materially smaller, especially in relation to the livestock population. The 1943 oats and barley crops are expected to fall about 14 per cent under 1942, and corn conditions so far have not been very favorable. Carry-over stocks of oats, barley and corn are well above average, however, and somewhat larger than a year ago.

Despite the less favorable hay-livestock ratio in Oregon and near by states, the United States hay supply situation is fairly good. The new crop is expected to be larger than average although smaller than last year, with the carry-over

above 1942 and well above average.

Prospects for the new hay crop have been much better in the eastern part of the United States than in the west. In relation to hay consuming livestock the hay situation is the most unfavorable in parts of Oregon and nearby states.

In general, the relationship between livestock numbers and feed supplies is approaching the problem stage. Prospective production of crops used for human food does not look serious, although the supply of some items like deciduous fruit, and a few commercial vegetable crops probably will fall short. Much depends upon growing conditions and the needs overseas.

so that the number of days the patient is eligible for care can be cleared.

How about hospital care for chronic cases that a member has had prior to joining; will this be covered?

Yes. It will cover the operating room, lab, fees, anesthetic, drugs, dressings, and all other benefits listed under services rendered.

Does it pay for surgery, hospital calls, by the doctor, etc.?

No. This plan pays for all normal "hospital" expense incurred while you are in the hospital.

How about nursing? It pays for the regular floor nursing. If you need a "special nurse" it would not pay for this service.

Will it be possible for families to join at all times during the year?

Yes. At the first of the month you may join. Your membership
