**Can Your Own Tomato Juice and Chili Sauce This Year**

One of the things that hits us hardest in the whole rationing program is the relatively high point value of canned juices — it was so wonderfully simple to have rows of cans on hand for instant use!

Vitamin-fresh — right from our own Victory Gardens. And it's ever so easy to do. Tomato juice doesn't even require processing. All that's needed in the way of canning equipment is the jars and tops, with or without rubber rings depending on the type you choose.

Gather firm, red-ripe tomatoes for juice. The redder they are the better the finished tomato juice will look and taste — and remember that this is the one exception to the old adage that "haste makes waste." Haste prevents waste when you're making tomato juice . . . waste of precious Vitamin C, so no delays or interruptions from the time you pick the fruit until it's all sealed tight and set aside to cool.

It's also a good idea to use a cone shaped sieve, if possible, when you press out the juice. The less the tomatoes are exposed to air, the richer the flavor will be and the more Vitamin C you'll be canning away for the winter.

If you have lots of tomatoes in your garden, make your own chili sauce, too, this year. The recipe is really very simple and requires relatively little sugar.

**Canned Tomato Juice**

Allow about four pounds, firm, fully-ripe, red tomatoes for each quart jar. Wash, remove stems and any hard or green spots. Cut into eighths and simmer very gently, stirring occasionally, until soft. Put at once through a fine sieve to remove seeds and skin, then bring juice to a boil and pour immediately into hot sterilized jars and seal. Tomato juice does not require processing.

**Chili Sauce**

- 5 pounds ripe tomatoes
- 3 large onions
- 3 sweet green peppers

- 3 sweet red peppers
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons salt
- 1 teaspoon mustard (dry)
- 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 3 cups vinegar

Peel and core tomatoes, peel onions, remove seeds from peppers and chop all together. Add all ingredients except vinegar and boil gently for 2 hours, stirring occasionally. Add vinegar and cook slowly until thick. Pour into hot sterilized jars and seal.
