Garden Truck Thrives In Great Illinois Valley

This year, more than ever, it seems that the people in the valley have gone to town with their Victory Gardens.

Many farmers have brought specimens of what they raise and Tuesday S. A. Shepp, who has the old Croy place on the Illinois river, brought a turnip into the News office that he says is one of the largest he ever raised, and also said that his garden truck is doing better here than any place he has ever been.

Frank Freitas brought in an exceedingly large chicken egg the other day and Frank says this particular chicken gives him about four of these eggs a week. It was almost as large as a duck egg.

The valley farmers are doing very well this year with their crops. Chickens, turkeys, rabbits and fruits and vegetables are all thriving. Of course cattle and dairying has always been good here, but this year the other crops are doing much better than usual.

BROWN STAMPS TO REPLACE RED

WASHINGTON—Brown stamp "A" from Ration Book No. 3 becomes valid Sept. 12 for the purchase of meats, fats, oils, butter and cheese, and by Oct. 2 the brown coupons will completely replace the familiar red stamps of Ration Book 2. Point values remain unchanged.

Brown stamp "B" becomes valid Sept. 19. Both "A" and "B" expire Oct. 2. Stamp "C" will be effective Sept. 27, "D" on Oct. 23, "E" on Oct. 10 and "F" on Oct. 17. Those for expire Oct. 30. Meanwhile red stamps "X", "Y" and "Z" become valid Aug. 22, Aug. 29 and Sept. 5 respectively, and all will expire Oct. 2.

In announcing the new regulations, the office of price administration (OPA) said that henceforth the meat-fat stamps always will expire on the Saturday nearest the end of the month, and new sets will become valid on the following Sundays.

Blue stamps "U", "V" and "W" from Ration Book 2 will become valid Sept. 1 and expire Oct. 20.

In another phase of the rationing program, OPA announced that old-style "B" and "C" gasoline coupons will be no good after Sept. 1 and told automobile owners to exchange them, coupon for coupon, for the new type sheets between Aug. 23 and Sept. 1.

The rationing board is now mailing fuel oil applications to home owners, who may fill them out and return them by mail, thus saving a trip to the OPA office here, George Riddle of the OPA office said.

Most small home owners will get from 1 to 20 per cent more fuel oil this year than last, and some large home owners will benefit under a plan whereby maximum floor area allowance per person is raised, the OPA said.

COUNTY SCHOOLS TO HAVE TEACHERS

Both city superintendent of schools M. B. Winslow and county superintendent, Dale Ginn, expressed surprise at the report from Salem Saturday that Josephine county is short 20 teachers for the coming fall term.

Only one position in county schools, that of home economics teacher at the Kerby high school, remains unfilled at present and prospects are that all positions in city schools will be readily filled before start of city schools on Sept. 13. Only nine contracts remained to be signed and all are tentatively filed, Winslow said. R. Cloyd Riffe is expected again as instructor of music.

Only two schools in the county will not open this year and in each case the schools are suspending for lack of pupils. Pleasant Grove students will probably go to the Shan Creek school and the Payne school students will probably be transported to Kerby.
