1944 WINDSHIELD STICKERS CAN NOW BE PUT ON CARS

Windshield stickers validating the 1944 registration of motor vehicles in Oregon now may be used, Secretary of State Bob Farrell said. The stickers are valid after December 15th.

When the new 1944 stickers are attached to windshields, the old 1943 stickers must be removed, Farrell said. No stickers, except authorized ones, may be displayed on windshields in this state and the 1943 sticker will not be authorized after the new one is in place. The owner whose car was not registered in this state in 1943, and who has been operating in this state under reciprocal agreements with adjoining states, must now take out on Oregon registration. He will receive, in addition to the sticker, a set of 1942 license plates. Titles of these cars also must be transferred from the state of registration in 1943 to Oregon.

Farrell reminded vehicle owners who have not yet applied for 1944 registrations to do so at once to avoid the late rush period. Inadequate help for processing applications and the Christmas mail rush will cause delays to those who apply late, he said.

New Rust Preventives Effective

Many of the rust preventive compounds now being handled by oil companies are far more effective than ordinary oils and greases in preventing rust on farm machinery, according to information gathered by Clyde Walker, extension agricultural engineer at Oregon State college. While no work on this project has been done at

Corvallis, reports of tests elsewhere show that nine kinds of rust preventives protected exposed surfaces a year or more, compared with 7 to 30 days for crank-case oil and 60 to 90 days for axel grease.
