**USE FERTILIZER SAYS COUNTY AGENT**

With many barns practically empty, the hay market bare and high in price, and with high-protein feed non-existent, many livestock may face short rations until pasture season opens up in the late spring, stated O. K. Beals, county agent. The feed market may not be a buyer's paradise, but the fertilizer market is well stocked with nitrogen fertilizer, which is not a livestock feed, but which can be used to hurry the calendar and bring May pastures in April. Nitrogen makes grass grow regardless of cold weather and lack of sunshine.

Nitrogen fertilizer should be applied to pasture in late February or early March. It can be purchased either as ammonium nitrate, ammonium sulfate or ammonium phosphate. Ammonium nitrate is ordinarily used at the rate of 60 pounds to the acre, while 100 pounds of ammonium sulfate is necessary to supply an equal amount of plant food or 125 pounds of ammonium phosphate 16-20-0. Results will be equally favorable on mixtures of good perennial grasses, legumes and annual rye grass. There is no point in wasting material on pasture lands depleted to a point where only weeds remain.

Either the ammonium sulfate or the ammonium nitrate can be applied broadcast with a machine or by hand. Hand spreading is not entirely satisfactory because of the difficulty in making an even application. Either of these materials can be sprinkled on as a solution with simple, home-made equipment. Plans for constructing this equipment are available in the county agent's office.

The use of nitrogen will not replace superphosphate, landplaster, or sulphur commonly used on many pastures in this area. When used along with these materials it will prove even more effective than when used alone.

Nitrogen can be used profitably even on pastures which receive liberal applications of barnyard manure. Manure is ordinarily not effective until warm weather comes, while commercial nitrogen will make the grass grow almost regardless of weather.

Many pastures could profitably use two applications of nitrogen—the first late in February or early in March and a second early in April. Irrigated pastures can profitably use even more nitrogen than the non-irrigated farms. If feed is badly needed, irrigated pastures containing at least one-half grass will respond to three applications—the first two as suggested for other pastures, and another about the first of May.

**Crown Flour and Feeds**

On many farms it will be necessary to pasture this year's hay crops in the early spring. Here nitrogen can be used to advantage. The crop can be made to furnish early pasture without hurting the yield of hay. On hay crops two applications should be used — one in February or March to make pasture, and a second sometime between the middle of April and the first of May to help the crop overcome the effect of grazing. This will make the hay crop a little later and possibly aid in obtaining more settled weather for curing.

The sale of nitrogen fertilizers is governed by regulations issued by the War Food Administration. Surplus supplies are now available

FOR FLEET OR OFFICIAL VEHICLES using interchangeable rations, endorse coupons with the fleet or official designation, and city and State of main office. For commercial fleet vehicles, not operating under a fleet designation, use Certificate of War Necessity number.
