to speak, and the real form and nature of the opposition and its plans were revealed.

For some reason, the President and his organization are waging an all-out drive to block the passage of the state voting bill and to force the passage of the Federal ballot plan. Our committee has been smeared and slandered. Every trick in the book has been used and some new ones invented. The Rules Committee of the House has been ordered to stall the bill and prevent its consideration on the floor. There has been some hot debate on the floor about this delay these past few days. The hope apparently is that enough heat has been put on the Senate to make it reverse its previous action and pass the Federal ballot plan—and they wanted that done before the House had a chance to vote on the original Senate bill. My guess is the vote in the House will be close. * * *

The last half of this week has been devoted to the consideration of the United Nation's Rehabilitation and Relief agreement and authorization for appropriations up to one billion three hundred fifty millions for that undertaking. The plan is called UNRRA (pronounced unrah).

The Congress was not invited to take part in making the agreement. It was worked out in several state department and executive conferences and signed. Now the Congress is asked to approve it and provide the money. This method of handling the problem is resented by a great many members of Congress but that is the way it was done and it will have to be passed to back up the word of our officials in their dealings with other countries.

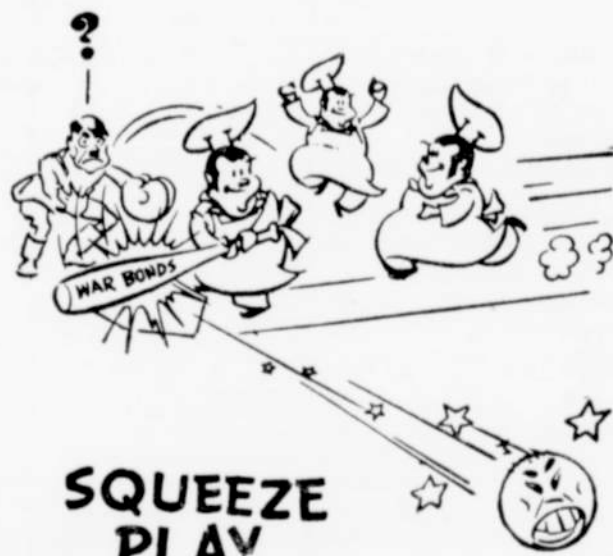
