Frozen Food Bulletin Gives Program for Year

That food preservation by freezing is a year-round process, especially for those who use family-sized storage lockers, is emphasized in a new O. S. C. extension bulletin, No. 623, "Food Preservation by Freezing." The bulletin is a revision and enlargement of previous publications on this subject from the college and is written by several members of the agricultural and home economics staffs.

Where facilities are available, freezing of foods has many advantages compared with other methods of preservation, the authors say. Greater quantities of essential vitamins can be preserved, less labor and time are required for preparation, and the finished product more closely resembles fresh food in palatability and appearance.

The 16-page bulletin contains sections on handling meat and poultry, game birds, fish and other seafood, eggs, dairy products, fruits, and vegetables.
