(c) General revenue aid to community.

(d) Convenience or desirability. Primarily the substance, purpose or objective of post war planning is for the benefit of the veteran. Therefore it is the absolute recommendation that all present and future committees have veteran representation thereon.

Other phases of postwar activities will come to light as the work of the Council progresses.

Continuing his remarks, Judge Johnson said he believed as far as Josephine county was concerned our greatest asset is irrigation. To further this development, he said that the county put up 2,500, the state matched this amount, and the Federal government matched it, making a total of \$7,500 that was supposed to be paid out in engineering data to ascertain the feasibility of irrigation in the county. To date the government has paid \$125,000 to determine this feasibility, and is still working on the plans. The projects listed, and the

feasibility of their construction are named as follows:

- 1—Weimer district.
- 2—Applegate district.
- 3—Illinois Valley district.
- 4—Merlin district.

The future development of irrigation in the county rests entirely with the people. If the people want these projects the government will loan the money without interest, to develop them. Judge Johnson made it very clear that it was his belief that reclamation was the greatest asset the county had. "We can still have a great future after the timber and minerals of the county have been harvested and mined," he said.
