Washington Letter

the 17-point foreign policy just announced and widely printed, plus an explanation of the difficulties and complications of international negotiations.

Mr. Hull acquainted us with details of the difficulties involved in getting what he called "small matters" ironed out. The big and basic questions are generally fairly easy to get together on, he said, but detail problems are constantly presenting themselves. Some of them require long and patient negotiation. By way of illustrating, he pointed out that a simple sounding problem that was easily solved by a columnist in one paragraph or by a radio commentator in three or four sentences often required a year or more of patient negotiating.

Dealing with our present powerful ally, Russia, is apparently complicated by the decided psychological difference in background between that country and the democracies. For the past 20 years the Soviet government has been frowned upon and has even at times been roundly berated by its present allies. Now that the situation is quite different, the Russians are most sensitive to criticism — or anything that sounds to them like criticism. This psychology is further enhanced by the fact that Russia has suffered severe losses in this war and has acquired something of an abused feeling based upon their contention that we (the other allies against Germany) have been lying back waiting for Russia to bring Germany to her knees. In other words getting on a picnicking and bridge-playing basis with a neighbor family after your children have thrown rocks through their windows and set your dog to chasing their family kitty takes a lot of mighty friendly talking over the back fence—especially so, if those same neighbors have been going about saying bad things about the way your family conducts itself and attempting to get some of your relatives to take steps to alter our way of living.

Secretary Hull. I did, however, gain an impression or two. The State Department seems to be woefully in need of a better public relations staff. It should take the people of the country into its confidence, so far as can be done, and should not place itself in a position of springing something new and startling on us that the people are in no way prepared, by previous information, to understand or approve.

I gained the impression, whether it is right or wrong I do not know, that the attitude of the State Department (and the Administration) in present handling of foreign relations and negotiations is not in keeping with our actual power in the world today. We do not seem to be forceful, to take a part of leadership. This, if true, may be a bit hard for the practical leaders

of other powers to understand—and hence be a source of confusion. From their point of view they would naturally expect this government to take a position of firmness and leadership which it apparently is not doing. Or is it? We sought to find out—but did not.

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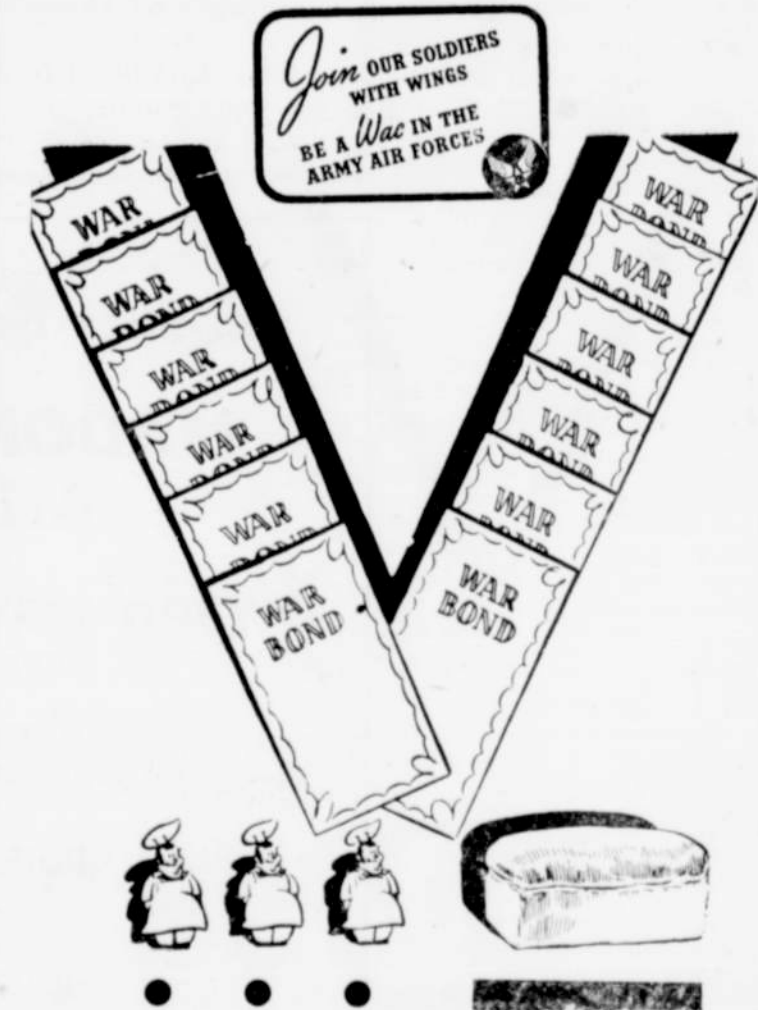
