"Boys and girls between the ages of eight and sixteen are yet too young to become soldiers, pilots, WACS or WAVES, but they can still do a vital home front job in combatting the deadly enemy fire," said Kenneth Martin, Josephine county chairman for Keep Oregon Green. These Green Guards now number over 10,000 in every Oregon county and they are becoming expert fire reporters and fire preventers.
