YOUTH FAIR

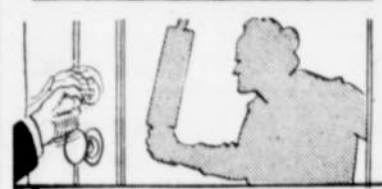
