The civilian government of the

Islands has no quarrel at all with military measures deemed necessary for security and for the pro-

per conduct of the war in the Pacific. If martial law is necessary, people from Hawaii say, there is no objection to it. But they insist upon being treated as loyal and patriotic citizens of the United States. They point out that the people of Hawaii have met their war bond quotas—and more, have contributed to the Red Cross, the USO and have otherwise been an integral part of the war effort. Thousands of their sons are in the service. All they now ask is that they be treated accordingly by the necessary military power — and they insist that they NOT be treated as if Hawaii is an occupied country to be run by a military government of occupation.

Several state primaries are being held next week so a light leg-

islative schedule is in prospect. As a matter of fact, there is very little legislation ready for floor action now. Several major bills are being completed in committee and will be reported out soon, but there will be nothing of consequence on the calendar for the coming week.
