DRIVERS FAIL TO KEEP SPEED DOWN

Only ten per cent of the drivers traveling over the Pacific highway during the first three months of 1944 held their speeds down at or below the 35 mile wartime speed limit, it was announced today at the safety division of the secretary of state's office.

Speed checks maintained by the state highway department disclosed that in January, 19 per cent of the drivers did not exceed 35 miles an hour with the same percentage in February. In March, the percentage dropped to nine.

In view of the trend to drive at higher rates of speed, the safety division quoted figures showing that speed is expensive, both in operational costs and in hazards due to accidents.

A recent study showed that the average damage to cars involved in accidents when traveling at 50 miles an hour or more was \$283.33, while the damage to cars traveling from 20 to 30 miles an hour was \$105.50.

Operational costs also are greater at the high speeds. Based on a drive of one thousand miles, at an average speed of 55 miles an hour, the cost would be \$30.33, or a little over three cents a mile. At an average speed of 35 miles an hour, the cost would be \$17.88.

By increasing the average speed from 35 to 55 miles an hour, the motorist would save ten hours in a thousand-mile journey, but the cost per hour saved would be \$1.20 due to increased operational costs.

With the emphasis now placed on saving tires, the costs of speed may be translated into shorter life time, the safety division said. Tire wear at 55 miles an hour is approximately three times the wear at 35 miles an hour. Observance of the 35 mile war time speed means less expensive operation, less danger of accident, less damage if an accident does occur, and longer life for the vehicle and its equipment, the safety division declared.

FIRST AID FOR FARM FIRES GIVEN

"A clean house seldom burns" is an adage which contains a good

deal of truth, according to Ruth E. Crawford, home demonstration agent. But even after papers and rags have been turned in for salvage, after dirty chimneys and flues have been cleaned and repaired, after all other precautions have been taken, fires are still bound to occur.

To help in emergencies, Miss Crawford suggests that farms, far removed from organized fire protection, should have a kit of fire fighting aids on hand. According to the National Fire Protection Association, each farm should have buckets of sand, water, and a hose and axe reserved solely for use in case of building fires. A ladder long enough to reach the roof of buildings not protected with fire-resistant roofing should be readily available. A flame-proof blanket is another help in case of a home fire. And, the fire extinguisher should be checked to be sure it is ready to operate in case of need. For fighting fires in woods and fields, keep such tools as shovels, axes, rakes, and "fire-swatters" handy.
