I visited one of the towns here yesterday. It is a fairly large town but I didn't like it very well. The buildings are all made of brick and are built close together. The streets are real narrow. There is only room for about two small cars to pass on one of the roads and in some places they could not pass. You hardly ever see a car here and the ones you do see are about the size of an Austin and none of them are bigger than a Willys. Most of the people travel either by bus or bicycle. You can't get anything to eat in a restaurant as the food is all rationed. You can go to a show but the shows are old and I have seen most of them at home.

Most of the people here are farmers and almost every inch of ground is being farmed. They sure have some beautiful pasture lands. There isn't hardly any wooden fences. They are all made of

iron or else they are just hedges. They sure have some fine cattle. The stock here seems to be larger than our cattle back home. Most of them are Guerneys.
