FARM LUMBER ALLOCATED IN STATE

Allocation of lumber to Oregon counties for farm use has been made by the state AAA office, which has been informed by national officials that the situation is "tighter" than ever before. The amounts allocated will be distributed by the county committees to applicants purely on the basis of need, as in the past, according to R. B. Taylor, state AAA chairman. Contrary to some reports, there is no requirement whatever that a farmer be a cooperator in AAA programs to obtain needed lumber, Taylor says.

78.2 million by January 1, 1945. This would require the slaughter of 35 million cattle and calves during 1944 or 7.7 million more than in 1943, the previous record year. Slaughter goals of 28 million and 30 1/2 million cattle and calves for 1942 and 1943 brought slaughter of only 27.1 and 27.3 million head in those years respectively, emphasizing the enormity of the marketing problem and the necessity of everyone doing any and everything he can to attain the required slaughter this year.

"This whole situation would appear to indicate that such action as the following is required of western cattlemen:

"1. Plan to dispose of all surplus animals this year so as to effectively balance numbers with available or reasonably anticipated feed supplies.

"2. Market these animals as early as possible. Thought should be given to marketing any cattle which might now go as slaughter animals, as well as stockers and feeders which can be marketed satisfactorily, at this time. Range animals which are to be sold for slaughter during the summer or fall should be marketed as early as practicable.

"3. Make special efforts to market locally or ship on their own or cooperatively in case buyers are scarce."—Courier.


