AAA LEGUME STRAW PAYMENT

After Oregon growers thresh their legume seed this year, including the cover crop seeds of vetch and peas, they can earn an additional practice payment by leaving the straw on the ground when combining or by returning it to the soil if a stationary thrasher is used, according to Jens F. Svinth, county agent.

Legume straw has a high fertilizer value, as repeatedly pointed out by Art King, extension soils specialist. When plowed under it not only adds plant food in large quantities but improves the physical condition of the soil by the ad-

dition of organic matter. Recognizing the high future value of having this straw returned, the AAA is encouraging the practice by a definite conservation payment. The payment amounts to 60 cents per acre for every acre on which vetch or pea straw is returned to the soil. This payment cannot be earned if legume straw is burned on the farm.

This practice payment was authorized for the first time last year, but came too late for the word to get around very completely.

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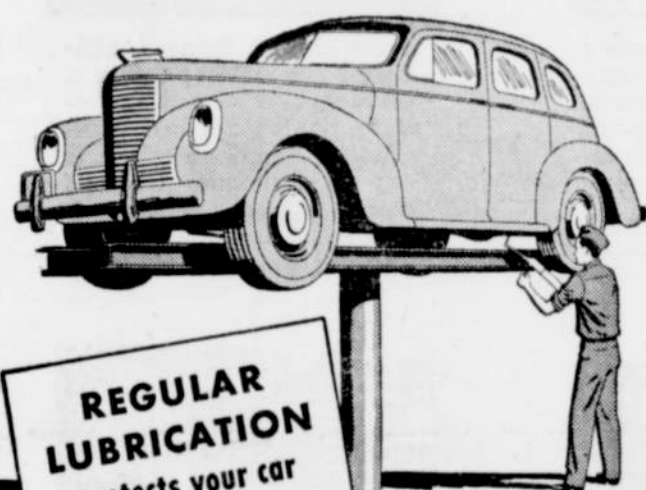
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
