Henry C. Aiken of Heppner, Democratic state chairman, outlined the party platform. L. E. Athey spoke, representing Edward Smith for long term U. S. Senator, and C. W. Crarey represented labor, with several other speakers on the program.

AAA on Calendar Year; Closing Date Dec. 31

Opening and closing dates for AAA conservation practices have been placed on a uniform calendar basis for all parts of Oregon by action of the state committee. Chairman Robert Taylor has just announced. Coast counties and eastern Oregon were previously on this basis.

Effect of the change is to extend the closing date for 1944 practices from September 1 to December 1 in Willamette valley and southern Oregon counties, Taylor explained. This may be important to many AAA cooperators who can continue this year's projects through the fall months. The state committee considered other seasonal matters as well as next year's budget at the session just held at the state headquarters on the O. S. C. campus.
