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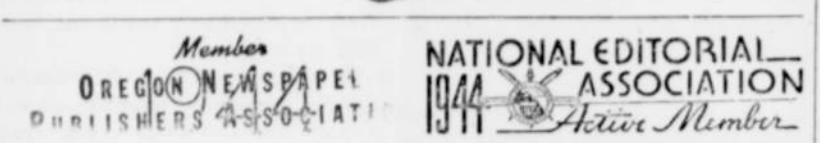

NOW IS TIME TO MAIL CHRISTMAS GIFTS OVERSEAS

If you want to be sure your Christmas package reaches that service man or woman overseas in time for Christmas, you should mail it between now and October 15, the Office of War Information says, on the basis of information from the armed services.

Only one package may be sent by or for a person or concern to any one soldier in any one week between now and October 15, and the 30-day period, September 15-October 15, is the only time during which packages may be sent to soldiers overseas without a specific written request from the soldier or without an APO postmark from the soldier to whom the gift is to be sent.

Mark the package "Christmas Parcel," OWI says, and use a label that does not look like a postage mark or stamp. Print the address so that it will not run, streak, smudge or fade, and put an additional copy of the address and return address inside the package, so that if the package comes apart the additional copy can be used.

Popular gifts with soldiers in all theaters of war are automatic pencils, pocket-size books, cigarettes, cigars, stationery, razor blades, wrist watches, money orders, pocket-size photographs in waterproof folders, tobacco pouches, dried fruit, vacuum-packed nuts, pipes, small shaving kits, hard candy, soap, wallets and games such as checkers, cards and puzzles.

For Navy men in all theaters, popular gifts are sneakers for wear in showers, pocket knives (the more attachments the better), moccasin-type bedroom slippers, pocket-size books (but no war stories), pocket-size dictionaries, Bibles, insect repellants, alarm clocks, small snapshots, playing cards, toilet kits, air mail stationery, shaving kits, fountain pens, sun glasses, steel mirrors, coat hangers, wash cloths, dice, poker chips, folding writing pads, dehydrated fruit juices, favorite pipe tobacco mixtures, foot powder, small homemade personal articles, fruit cake, tinned luxury foods, olives, sardines and nuts.
