For Aid to Merchant Seamen

Men engaged in the job of helping to transport supplies and equipment to the fighting fronts frequently return with "convoy nerves." United Seamen's Service in conjunction with the War Shipping Administration provides these men with rest and recreation homes for rehabilitation and "psychological first aid." In addition, in ports all around the world merchant seamen find relaxation and recreation in U. S. S. clubs that have a "back home" atmosphere. U. S. S. operates 94 of these clubs on six continents.

For Food for Starving Allies

Five thousand Greek children have no homes except the canteens in Athens where they are fed once a day by Greek War Relief, which is financed through the National War Fund. Many of the hungry in other lands—heroic peoples who fought the oppressor long before we were stabbed in the back—also get a chance at life through the generosity of the American people.

For Seeds for the Scorched Earth

In China, and in other countries, the devastated land is ready to grow food again. This food can help banish the specter of starvation, but to grow it, the farmers need seeds. They have been so busy fighting that they have had no chance to raise seeds. A part of what they need can be supplied by the National War Fund.

For Medicines

Anti-malarial tablets were flown across the Atlantic to aid the stricken people of Yugoslavia. More medicines will be needed to fight typhus, tuberculosis and all the other dread plagues that follow the wake of war. Funds raised for the National War Fund will help supply these medicines, vitamins, surgical instruments.

For Clothing

In many countries where there has been no great production of civilian clothing for years, the need is acute. This coming Winter can be a killing Winter if greater supplies of clothing are not sent abroad. Money given for the National War Fund will help make this possible.

For Needs in Your Community

In addition to other needs, funds are required for many services in your own community. These funds pay for pre-natal care for servicemen's wives, for hospitalization, and for calls by visiting nurses.

A portion of the money collected in towns having Community Chests will be used to help solve problems arising in war boom-towns, providing facilities for normal social life, building towards the peace towns of the future.

Part of the money will be used to fight the evils of juvenile delinquency. It will help prevent good boys and girls from becoming bad boys and girls. The whole community benefits when people give to the Community War Fund.

These companies cannot get a license in Oregon because they are not up to standard and only pay on policies when they have to. A resident of Oregon could not sue them in this state because they are not licensed, which would make a suit very expensive for a resident to go to some other state.

The Oregon State Insurance commissioner says:

In purchasing insurance of any kind, it is well to make certain that the company is authorized to transact business under the laws of Oregon and maintains licensed agents in the state; and, in order to satisfy yourself on these points, write or call upon the Insurance Department, Salem, Oregon, or consult a licensed agent in your community.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE

To all Property Owners who have not filed their correct mailing address with the tax office, and particularly those who have not recorded their deeds prior to January 1, 1944:

110-833 O. C. L. A. "It shall be the duty of each person, firm or corporation owning real or personal property within the state, or against whom taxes upon real or personal property are chargeable, to keep the tax collector of the county where said real or personal property is situate, informed of the true and correct address of said person, firm or corporation, and no such person, firm or corporation who fails, refuses or neglects to keep said tax collector so informed shall be permitted to plead lack of due notice given by said tax collector in any suit, action or other proceedings commenced or prosecuted under the provisions of this act or in any matter growing out of the administration of this act."

We are preparing to mail out all statements for taxes due this fall (1944-45 tax) so that each property owner may have the opportunity of taking advantage of the discount allowed if paid before November 15th. However, this cannot be done unless we have your cooperation in registering your address.
