SAFE BURNING ON FARMS URGED BY FORESTRY LEADER

Mr. X, an Oregon farmer, plowed a six-foot fire guard around his stubble field and then set fire on the upwind side without first burning a wide fire break on the downwind side of the field. Mr. X was soon trying to obtain lumber to rebuild his barn, which was completely destroyed when the fire jumped the too narrow plowed fire guard.

Dan D. Robinson, newly appointed extension forester at Oregon State college, uses this incident to point out essential safeguards for any farm and woodland trash burning. In the first place, Robinson points out, the O. S. C. Extension service, the AAA, and other agricultural agencies have long strongly advised against any stubble burning except under extremely unusual circumstances. All Oregon lands need these crop residues for continued profitable production.

If stubble burning is done, however, Robinson says the safest way after obtaining a burning permit, is to plow two sixfoot strips approximately 20 feet apart, burn out the intervening stubble first, and then fire the main field from the downwind side. Even then, it is advisable, he says, to have plenty of firefighting materials available and to notify neighbors and the local farm fire crew when the burning is to take place.

Ordinarily the period from October 1 to 20 is about the best time in Oregon for burning slashings and similar forest residue, Robinson adds. Such burning is encouraged if properly carried out, and usually precedes the seeding of logged-off areas to forage grasses and

legumes. For such burning, he says, plans need to be flexible enough to take advantage of favorable burning conditions on short notice. To take full advantage of favorable burning conditions it is often wise to sample-burn a few piles or spots in the slash before the entire area is burned. If burning is done within a forest district a fire permit must be obtained from the fire warden.

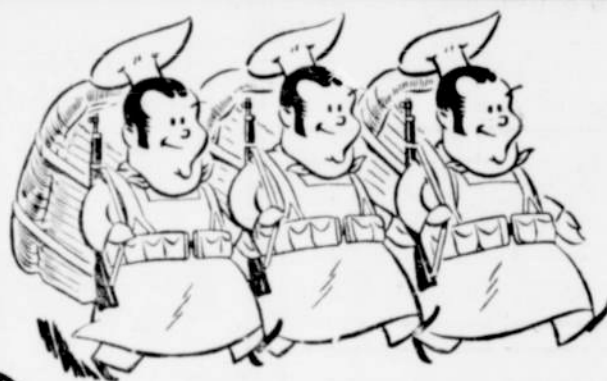
