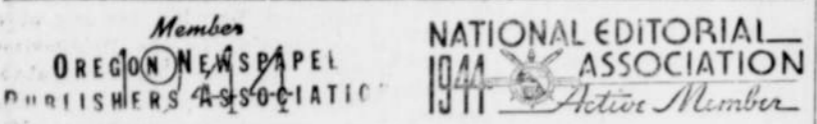

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Enumerators Wanted For Valley Farms

Offices for Census District No. 2 of Oregon, comprising Lane, Linn, Douglas, Josephine, Jackson, Coos, and Curry counties have been opening in the Lumberman's Building, 121 East Broadway, Eugene, Oregon, announces Paul N. Plank who has been named local supervisor in charge of the area. George H. Todd, Eugene, has just recently been announced here as assistant supervisor to Plank. Enumeration of farms which occurs every five years, by act of Congress, will start January 8, 1945.

Plank asks that all persons interested in assisting with this work contact his office or write. First preference in hiring of enumerators will be given to veterans, thereafter to anyone qualified. It is urged, that farmers and their wives consider seriously helping to the job of enumerating.

Starting about December 15th a series of schools will be held lasting three days. These will be schools of instruction for those who are going to do the enumerating job.

Farmers are asked to, as much as is possible, have the information in readiness for the census enumerator when he arrives at the farm. It is pointed out by Plank that all information give the enumerator will be held in absolute confidence, and that no one has access to the information, except the authorized employes of the bureau of the census.

GRANGES OF COUNTY HAVE LARGE QUOTA

Josephine county's seven granges will be responsible for this county's farm quota in the Sixth War Loan, it was announced by County Chairman Charles R. Cooley.

Granges of eastern Oregon are competing in selling bonds in this campaign for registered Aberdeen Angus bull and a pure bred Duroc Jersey sow, while in western Oregon granges are in competition for a registered Jersey bull and a pure bred Romney ram, according to Morton Thompkins, master of the state grange.

Grange quotas for this county as announced by C. H. Brooks, master of Josephine county Pomona

grange are: Illinois Valley, \$57,000; Deer Creek, \$44,500; Fruitdale, \$30,000; Williams, \$30,000; Rogue River valley, \$104,000; Redwood, \$86,500; Shan Creek, \$23,500.

MINING LAWS IN O. & C. BILL

Mining laws were made applicable to the Oregon-California re-vested grant lands, under an amendment added by Representative White (D-Idaho) to the O & C authority bill, says a press dispatch this week in the Grants Pass Courier.

The public lands committee approved White's amendment to the bill adding a mining provision similar to that contained in the Taylor Grazing act. It reads:

"Nothing herein contained shall restrict prospecting, locating, de-

velopment of mining, entering, leasing or patenting mining reservations under laws applicable thereto."

The bill itself would transfer the administration of re-vested forest lands, now handled by the forest service, to the O & C administration. It has been placed on the House calendar with favorable committee recommendation.

BULB RAISING

The speaker had a chart that showed the increase from the bulb. From the mother bulb came bulb-lets that gave 24 commercial bulbs the second year and 160 bulb-lets. The 160 bulb-lets would be commercial the following year with a corresponding increase from each bulb. One can see where the bulbs would increase to such proportions that commercial bulbs would be so plentiful the market would be so badly bent it would not be profitable to raise them.

Stressing quality, not quantity, Mr. McWhorter said that a very profitable business could be built up, but he impressed strongly on quality of bulbs and do not keep the market glutted.

Japan was the chief supplier of bulbs before the war. The price paid for Japanese bulbs was 3 cents for bulbs five to nine inches; four and a half cents for bulbs nine to 10 inches; six cents for 10 to 11 inches. Contrast this price with what bulbs bring now and try to visualize what is going to happen when the buyers can buy all they want and pick what they want.

Mr. McWhorter gave a very interesting lecture on lily bulbs and showed some interesting pictures concerning them. We do not have space to tell all he told about lily culture and the different species. He did say, however, that lily bulbs could be raised here successfully.
