CHRISTMAS

The Christmas tree with its hanging toys was a custom borrow from the Romans and is told about by the poet Virgil. The visits of "Santa Claus" bearing gifts belongs properly to December 6, the day of St. Nicholas.

"KEYS OF THE KINGDOM"

Out of the maze of thousands of books emerges a truly great one, "Keys of the Kingdom," one of the most outstanding books of the season.

The story carries an impact that is startling. It is a simple story, full of love, life and adventure. The narrative of the story is told simple and yet forcibly. It is written in the new style with very little description and details—the story is plainly told and plainly understood.

This is a book telling of the struggles of a man—from his childhood to his advanced age. Father Francis Chisholm is the main character of the book, and he is the outstanding one. The story begins with the aged Father reminiscing over his childhood. Along his path through life Father Francis encountered many people and helped them form a better destiny for themselves.

Father Francis's struggle thru priesthood, and his adventure in China is artfully told, making the priest near to those who have known hardship in their own lives. As an added touch Andrew, Father Francis's nephew, is introduced, the small lad plays an important part in Francis's life—he aids the priest in keeping his parish and ordainment.

A. J. Cronin has an outstanding book in "Keys of the Kingdom." Read it and enjoy every page in passage of a truly great novel.
