PARALYSIS HITS FARMS HARD IN '44

The Crippler, infantile paralysis, visits the lonely farmhouse as well as the city tenement and the town mansion. This was proved again last year when America experienced the second worst epidemic of infantile paralysis recorded in its history. Following its usual indiscriminating pattern, polio invaded the farms of rich and poor alike, and was no respecter of age, race, creed or color.

In North Carolina, New York, Kentucky, Virginia, Ohio, Michigan and Pennsylvania where the worst outbreaks occurred, many of the victims were farm children. But in every stricken state, swift aid was available because through the March of Dimes — held each January in Celebration of the President's Birthday—funds were on hand, ready to be converted into emergency aid. These funds made it possible for every victim to receive early medical care, an important factor in minimizing crippling, and provided the best of nursing care and treatment.

COUNTY NAMES OFFICIAL PAPERS

The county court at its first meeting of the year made appointment of official county newspapers as required by law, which specifies that the newspaper with the largest bona fide circulation shall be named the county official paper. In counties having a population of 10,000 or more two newspapers are to be appointed.

County Judge W. A. Johnson said today that the Grants Pass Daily Courier and the Illinois Valley News, of Cave Junction, had been appointed official newspapers for the publication of regular monthly proceedings of the county court and the annual and semi-annual reports of county officials.

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS OR KEEPERS

Sec. 32-2414, Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated, provides that every person owning or keeping any dog over the age of eight months within the state of Oregon shall, not later than March 1 of each year or within thirty days after he becomes owner or keeper of such dog, procure from the Clerk of the county in which said person resides a license for such dog by paying to the County Clerk a license fee, determined by the county court of said county. . . . The fee in Josephine county is \$1.00 for a male or spayed female and \$1.50 for a female. Such license fee shall be the only license or tax required. . . .

Sec. 32-2415, further provides that any owner or keeper of any dog who shall fail to procure a license, as provided in section 32-2414, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a fine of ten dollars for each offense, together with costs of proceedings.
