## Canned Eggs and Milk Fighting Men's Menu

Open a can of eggs and a box of milk for breakfast. Sounds silly, doesn't it? But that's what is cooking with the army chef—the man who feeds the men who fight.

Of course, it's done with dehydrated food, not mirrors. A whole new field in cookery has been opened by the army's use of moisture-minus eatables. Great advantages are gained when a fast moving, hard-fighting army can be fed from a few compact packages.

Noted for its inexpensive qualities and simple transportation, dehydration has another point in its favor—PRESERVATION. Micro-organisms responsible for food dehydration form—but dormant, spoilage are still present in them due to the lack of water.

By definition, dehydrated foods are "fresh foods from which water and indelible portions such as peels, cores, stems and bones have been removed." So, forget about cleaning the vegetables, cracking the eggshells, or anything else. Just soak in the right amount of water the required length of time, and proceed with "business as usual."

An army cook overseas can turn out a meal of some 20 different items, all made with dehydrated food. Special schools in this country are now being conducted for all "Gee-Eye" food fixers to learn the proper handling of the products.

Included in the long list of food stuffs processed for shipping are meats, cheese, milk, eggs, vegetables. More are being added every day and all are a forerunner of the American kitchen of the future—eggs in a can, and milk in a box.

## Washington Letter

Federal funds provides \$3,729,000 for federal aid highways, \$2,545,000 for secondary and farm to market roads, and \$811,000 for highway improvements within urban areas. The funds allocated for secondary roads may be used for improvement of such roads in towns and villages of 5000 population or less. A maximum of 10 per cent of any of the three allocations may be used for grade crossing elimination.

City, county, and state officials will work together in formulating the program for the state. State officials will submit the plans to the Federal Bureau of Public Roads for final approval. State highway officials have been unable to plan any broad program for the post-war period in the past. The new law makes possible a complete program which can be started immediately when the war ends.

All unmarried widows of World War I veterans may now apply for \$35 per month pension under law passed late in the last

session of Congress. Previously, pensions were paid only to those widows showing that the veteran had service incurred disability.

To qualify, the widow must show that she is unremarried, that the veteran had not less than 90 days' service with honorable discharge, and that her income is less than \$1000 per year if she has no children, and less than \$2500 if there are children. To the base pension of \$35 is added \$10 for the first child and \$5 for each additional child. I will be glad to send application forms and information to any person on request.



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
