TIMBER STAND ADEQUATE FOR FUTURE NEEDS

In a message from west coast lumber manufacturers to 20,000 building materials dealers of America published in the January issue of "Big Trees," the Lumbermen's association said, "The relationship of the major producing industry of Oregon and Washington to America's dealers in building materials is of vital importance to all who live in this region. Normally these dealers are the men who turn lumber into revenue for Oregon and Washington. However, for three years retail lumber reserves have been steadily dwindling, in supplying material for war housing, farm building repairs, and other vital civilian needs. The war left little west coast lumber for the trade. Last summer there was promise of increased lumber allowances for retail stocks and civilian uses. In November that promise began to fade. Our reserves in Europe blacked it out.

"The retail lumber dealers in Brooklyn, Centerville, Iowa, Los Angeles, and other normal lumber distribution centers know the demands of war on the forest industries. Their main want in our

NEW LAND BOOM

Land prices in Oregon are now at about the same level as the World War I land boom peak, according to a discussion of the trend in land values contained in the current issue of the Agricultural Situation and Outlook issued by the O. S. C. Extension service. The Oregon index stands at about 163 per cent of the 1935-1939 level. The index was 91 at the bottom of the "bust" in 1930-1934, the report shows.

ARMY TRUCK SALE RULES CHANGED

Recent changes in the procedure governing sale of surplus army trucks by the Treasury Procurement division are called to the attention of Oregon farmers by the state AAA committee.

All truck sales will be made on an informal bid basis, and no more negotiated sales will be made, according to the revised regulations. The sales are similar to auctions, except that the bids are written and each prospective buyer may make only one bid on any one truck but may bid on as many trucks as he desires.

Under the truck program, AAA committees issue letters of recommendation to users seeking trucks who are contributing to the war food program. In case of tie bids, authorized dealers buying for resale to users holding these letters are given preference.

U. S. EGG GOALS REVISED UPWARD; MORE HOGS SOUGHT

An upward revision of national egg goals for 1945 and extension of hog support prices to March, 1946, are among the changes just made by the War Food administration, according to information supplied the O.S.C. Extension service from Washington, D. C.

The egg production goal had originally been set at 5920 million dozen, which was 16 per cent below the 1944 estimated production. After taking into account the recommendations made at state goal meetings and the additional needs for eggs from 1945 production, the goal was raised to 4350 million dozen eggs, or only approximately 7 per cent below the 1944 record production.

The new goal, if reached, will provide 347 eggs for each civilian in 1945, which is equal to the record consumption in 1944. It will also provide for all military requirements. The Oregon goal had

already been set as a higher level than the original national goal called for, and was based on an indicated reduction of approximately 11 per cent in laying hens that had occurred by last December.

The revised national goal calls for raising about the same number of chicks for flock replacements as were raised last year, which is also the recommended procedure for Oregon.

The move to extend present hog support prices to March 31, 1946, is part of the general effort to encourage higher hog production in 1945 than is now indicated by figures on spring farrowing. Although the national spring farrowing goal was set at 102 per cent of the 1944 figure, the estimated farrowing nationally is only 93 per cent of last spring's total. In Oregon the reduction is even greater, with an indicated 22,000 sows to farrow as compared with 33,000 last year.
