Greyhound's New Fares Start March 1

Pacific Greyhound Lines announces reductions approximating 20 per cent in Oregon intrastate fares between Portland and the Oregon-California state line.

New tariffs are in the hands of the printer, and it is hoped the fares can be made effective March 1. These fare reductions are the result of studies which have been conducted for the past several months and after consultation with the Public Utilities Commissioner of Oregon.

Here are some comparisons of present fares and the new fares between Cave Junction and other Oregon cities:

Cave Junction to	Present Fare	New Fare
Portland	\$5.70	\$4.85
Salem	4.80	4.05
Corvallis	4.40	3.60
Eugene	3.65	3.00
Cottage Grove	3.25	2.65
Roseburg	2.20	1.85

Grants Pass	.95	.65

These fares reflect reductions between Cave Junction and only a few of the principal points affected. Reductions are being made between practically all points along the route and would be too numerous to quote here. Complete tariffs will be on file with the Public Utilities Commissioner of Oregon within a short time.

These fare reductions indicate Pacific Greyhound Lines faith in the progress and growth of the Illinois Valley.

UNDULANT FEVER CONTROL PROGRAM

The state wide interest in the relationship of dairy sanitation and milk handling methods to the control of undulant fever will be reflected in the program of the fifty-first annual convention of the Oregon Dairymen's association at Oregon state college, January 15 to 17. The main program will start Tuesday, January 16, following committee sessions on Monday according to programs just distributed by Roger Morse, secretary of the association and extension specialist in dairying at O. S. C.

Among eight to ten principal speakers on the session programs at least half will touch on some phase of the disease-control subject. Committees on legislation, herd improvement, disease control,

sales promotion, and resolutions will begin their work Monday. Tuesday afternoon the Oregon Guernsey Cattle club and the Oregon Holstein Breeders association will hold annual meetings, and the Oregon Jersey Cattle club will hold a business session. The annual banquet will be Tuesday night, with S. B. Hall, Multnomah county agent, speaking on dairying in Argentina.

County Committeemen To Attend State AAA Meet

Farmer committeemen representing all Oregon counties will assemble at Corvallis January 18-20 for the state conference of AAA county committeemen R. B. Taylor of Adams, chairman of the state AAA committee, has announced. This is the first such state meeting since the war.

OREGON CAVES BOARD ELECTS

Frank Mashburn was named as president of the board of directors of the Oregon Caves resort at the annual meeting last week in Grants Pass. Sam H. Baker was named vice-president; A. E. Voorhies, secretary. These three men have served in the same capacity since the organization was started in 1923.

Other members of the board are Richard L. Sabin, Niel R. Allen, John Hampshire, James Christian and L. M. Mitchell.

Cave admissions for the past season numbered 3427. Manager Sabin reported, although operations at the caves have been closed for the last two seasons. Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Tykal are caretakers at the resort and Dick Rowley, guide. Rowley has served in this capacity for the past 40 years.

Navy hospital, but the Army will not release it.

This splendid 1500-bed hospital facility, complete with the finest of modern equipment, is idle and has been idle for many months. The Army needs more hospital beds, but needs them in other parts of the country. Under its policy of hospitalizing men as near their homes as possible, the Army has not yet found it necessary to use the Camp White Hospital.

"Keeping Livestock Healthy" is the title of the Agriculture Year-

book issued in 1942. Because of the popularity of the book, it was reprinted last year and is now available for distribution.

The book contains more than 1200 pages of information on diseases and parasites of cattle, horses, swine, poultry, and other farm animals and giving suggestions for prevention, diagnosis and cure. There are many valuable hints for any farmer who is engaged in the production of livestock.

Each member of the House receives a limited allotment of these books to be distributed without cost. If there are livestock growers in the Fourth district who desire the book and did not receive a copy of the first edition, I shall be glad to fill requests for the book as long as my allotment lasts.

The National Housing Agency is about ready to announce the details of its emergency housing construction program. In the closing hours of the last congress \$15,000,000 was appropriated for this purpose. The program is now in final conference stage. 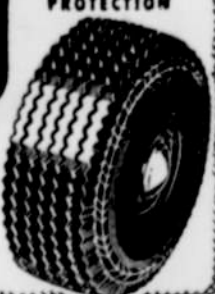
