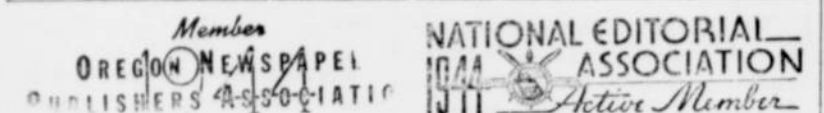

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GETTING TOUGHER

While we, in the Illinois valley, have been getting by, as far as living conditions are concerned, much better than our cousins in the big cities, nevertheless, we are going to have to take up another notch in our belts and feel the war a little more than we have been. Not that it will hurt us any, but some of us may complain a little more about restrictions. But before we start complaining, let us imagine ourselves in the front line trenches, half starved, cold, wet and bullets flying all around—Then thank God that you are home, comfortable and getting more than we are entitled to.

The war situation is not getting any better very fast. Of course, we are gradually forcing the enemy back on all fronts, but the progress is very slow and it is costing us something terrible in lives of our boys. Notices are coming back more often now, that some of the boys from Josephine county aren't coming back, and more of these notices will continue to come as long as the war continues.

While we expect Germany to fold up this year, we may get a shock and be fighting them until Christmas, but it really does not look like it at present. After Germany, it may take a long time to conquer Japan. We will practically have to exterminate them, and this is going to cost us a tremendous price in the lives of boys—some of them our boys. But it must be done. Japan asked for what she is going to get. They started this war, but we will do the finishing.

Japan said, when we rushed aid to the stricken country by earthquakes, she would never forget what we did for them. Wonder if they have an idea we will ever forget what they did at Pearl Harbor?

The war is getting tougher. Take a look at your present conditions and do what you can to improve them for you and yours. We're going to have to take it on the chin for a long time yet. Pull the old belt up a notch and go about your usual duties with a smile on your face and a prayer in your heart for the boys in the war.

WOULD YOU LIKE THIS?

Suppose you picked up your morning newspaper and read that the federal government, by authority of an act of Congress, was going to exempt the residents of the following towns from payment of taxes on cigarettes: Los Angeles, Cleveland, Seattle, all cities in Tennessee, Jacksonville, and dozens of other hand-picked communities, while the cities of New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Detroit, Pittsburgh, Boston, Baltimore, Washington, and approximately nine out of every other ten cities in the United States would have to go on paying the federal tax on their smokes.

We can readily imagine what a storm of protest would go up from the smokers. Indignant editorials would snap and crackle. Radio commentators would volley and thunder.

That is exactly what is happening today with respect to the federal tax on the sale of electricity for residential use. Publicly-owned plants serving such communities as Los Angeles, Cleveland, Seattle, etc., are specifically exempt from the payment of the 3 per cent federal tax, while customers of privately-owned electric utilities, serving most of our American cities and nearly all of the larger ones, have to pay this tax.—Selected.
