The Inquisitor

(By Hugh Walpole)

The setting of the book is in old historic England, during the years of 1932 and 1934. Pictured in the passing of typical English summers, springs, falls, and winters.

In this book are stories of the lives of the people of the small Cathedral Village. Penny Marlowe, and her vivid life for Lampiron. Stephen Furze and his miserly instincts, and his outcome of his meanness. Jolly, booming Meke Furze is a likeable character driven to commit murder by the taunting of an older, morbid brother. Elizabeth Furze finds her love and realizes that all things worth having are hard won.

The story is enlivened by the revolt of the unemployed of Seaton, and the murder of Stephen Furze. Through the tumult of the revolt Stephen's murder is found. Lampiron, is cruelly slain, and the people of the Cathedral Village are rudely awakened to the facts of the church and life. The book holds an ethereal quality in the title alone. All through the book one feels the sinister presence of the Inquisitor that lurks over the tiny village.

All in all the book is good, depicting the lives of the simple, yet complicated lives of the people of the village. Told in simple narrative it holds and grasps one's attention. Four hundred eighty five pages of good reading is found in the book "The Inquisitor," by Hugh Walpole.
