file an application for a certificate to establish their eligibility for the loan. When that is established the loan application may be filed. The Veterans Administration guarantees up to 50 per cent of any loan, but not to exceed a total loan guaranty of \$2,000. The loan guaranty may be divided up on several different loans if the veteran so desires. All lending is done by individuals or private agencies who may desire to extend

credit to the veteran. If there are any veterans of the present war who desire information, I shall be glad to send them a pamphlet giving questions and answers.

Applications for pensions by veterans' dependents are practically swamping the Veterans Administration at this time. They are receiving from dependents of World War II veterans, approximately 1,000 applications a week, and under the law passed late last year making all World War I unmarried widows eligible for a pension, an average of 2500 applications a day are reaching the Veterans Administration.

USEFUL BULLETINS. Those

who are planning spring planting of farm crops, home gardens or flowers may be interested to know that there are available without cost numerous bulletins on subjects concerning the home and farm. Annually, each member of congress is assigned a limited allotment of bulletins which are distributed to constituents on request. A complete bulletin list will be mailed anyone writing me a card at 1631 House Office Building, Washington, D. C.

Two bulletins which may be of interest to most farmers are "Farm Bookkeeping and the Fed-

eral Income Tax", and "Useful Records for Family Farms". There is also a good selection of bulletins on farm buildings, construction and maintenance.
