Seed Purchase Deadline Set at March 10 by AAA

Closing date for the 1944 seed purchase program in Oregon has been set at March 10 by the state AAA committee. The deadline applies to purchases of 1944 seed from both dealers and producers. In announcing the action, R. B. Taylor, chairman of the state committee, pointed out that this is the fifth year that Commodity Credit Corporation has purchased through AAA committees, Oregon-grown cover crop seeds for shipment to southern and east central states. The seed ultimately provides a winter cover crop to check erosion and restore fertility on farm lands in those areas.

The closing date has been established to allow for shipment of the seed in ample time to clear warehouses for the 1945 crop. To date 24,683,000 pounds—more than 400 carloads—of 1944 seed have been shipped by the AAA. Included in the shipments were

JOSEPHINE COUNTY 4-H CLUB MEMBERS GET HIGH PRAISE

4-H records turned in to Lloyd C. Baron at the county agent's office for 1944, indicate that two Josephine County 4-H Club members exceeded their goal of producing enough food to feed a fighter.

They are John Q. Stewart, Jr., and Miss Hattie Schutzwohl. They will soon receive a certificate of appreciation from Major Gregory of the army quartermaster corps for their efforts.

John Q. Stewart, Jr.'s project consisted of three Jersey cows and one heifer. During the year his cows produced a total of 22,090 pounds of milk and 100 pounds of veal for market. According to army tabulations, this is the equivalent of enough food to feed four fighters for one year. John's gross

income for 1944 was \$1,163.95.

Miss Hattie Schutzwohl's project was one Jersey cow and one calf. During the club year her cow produced 13,856.6 pounds of milk, which is the equivalent of the food required to feed two and one-half fighters for one year. Her gross income was \$752.74.

Several other club members came very near the goal on the "feed a fighter" campaign.
