The Redwood Empire Association and the Golden Gate Bridge district are trying to impress the California Commission that they should realine the approach to the Golden Gate bridge and eliminate the now existing Waldo approach to the bridge.

It is difficult for an Oregonian to try to tell the California highway commission—or rather try to suggest—that the new Golden Gate Freeway approach to the bridge be given the green light sign after the war.

Yet as difficult as it may seem, we hope that the California highway commission will remember that Josephine county, Oregon, is the "End of the Trail," or the beginning, depending on which way one enters this world famous national artery, The Redwood Highway, and being on the tail end or entering end, we feel that we have a just argument in suggesting to the California highway commission that they give serious consideration to the new approach, for the bridge is the other end of the highway or the beginning, and any obstacle to the easy access of the world's greatest bridge correspondingly affects us, even if we are in Southern Oregon.

We get liberty if you want to call it that on Sunday. We like to get away from camp for awhile so we have to eat. The CB's have the best chow here so they flock over there. They unload ships so I think they swipe our chow, that's why theirs is so good. I'll go over and see him Sunday.

I have a surprise for you Mom. Did I ever tell you about jig tanks I hit with my bazooka D-Day on Saipan? They were attacking our regimental headquarters and I happened to be lucky enough to get two of them. I got the Navy Cross for it. Seven of us got them at the regiment and the general pinned them on yesterday at a big parade. It really was nice. I sent it home and I'll show it to you when I come home.

Am I pardoned now? I'll do better Mom. Love to all.

This Friday evening, March 9, there will be an important business meeting at the church. All who are interested are urged to attend.

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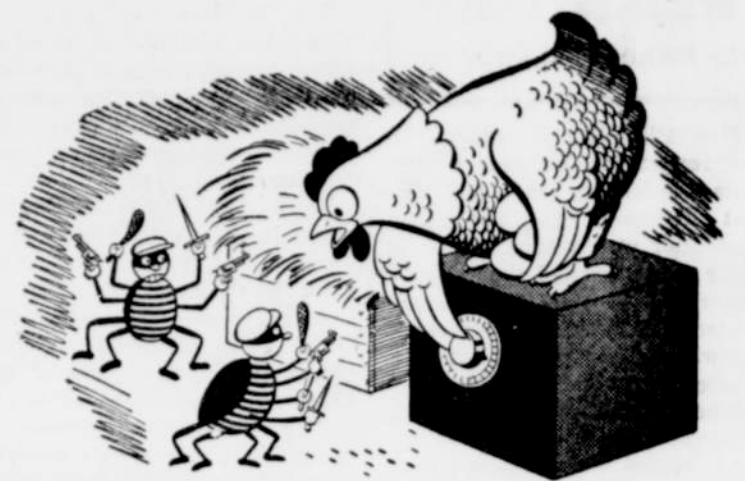
Greater Postwar Use of Dairy Products Planned

Continuation of quality improvement work on Oregon dairy products, including the passage of legislation aimed at protecting the public, was endorsed by the Oregon Dairy Manufacturers association at a one-day wartime conference in Portland.

Speakers pointed out that one of the biggest postwar jobs of the dairy industry will be to get butter and other dairy products back on consumers' tables in larger quantities than in prewar days to

avoid serious marketing difficulties with the present high level of production. The legislative program advocated by officers of both the dairy producers' and manufacturers' groups was endorsed.

Officers for next year are N. A. Peters, Portland, president; Ed L. Reeser, Albany, vice president; F. F. Moser, Corvallis, treasurer, and Dr. G. H. Wilster, Oregon State College, secretary. New directors are Alfred Long, Tillamook; C. H. Hutchens, Mt. Angel, and Marvin Davidson, Redmond. Five directors were re-elected.
