POISON OAK BECOMES VALUABLE

According to the Canada Lumberman, recent chemical experiments take the irritant out of the juice of the poison oak, once so obnoxious and produce a lacquer of very high quality. This is one virtue of the plant, says the article. From its berries, rich in fat, Japanese wax can be made, which is worth up to 25c per pound; and from its leaves we now obtain a tannin useful to the leather trade. The crop is valued at five millions, which the chemists claim will prove a conservative estimate. (Who wants to be the first to work in the poison oak factory.) — Timely Topics.
