MIDNIGHT CURFEW PROGRAM ENFORCED

By the terms of Director of War Mobilization James F. Byrnes' order, the War Manpower Commission in Oregon is responsible for the closure for business purposes at 12 o'clock midnight each day of the following types of entertainment establishments, which are to remain closed until the same hour at which they ordinarily open for business on the following day:

1. Night Clubs.
2. Sport Arenas.
3. Theaters.
4. Dance Halls.
5. Road Houses.
6. Saloons.
7. Bars.
8. Shooting Galleries.
9. Bowling Alleys.

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10. Billiard and Pool Halls.
11. Amusement Parks.
12. Carnivals.
13. Circuses.
14. Coin-operated Amusement Device Parlors.
15. Ice and Roller Skating Rinks.
16. Entertainment activities of Yacht, Country and all other clubs.
17. Dance Studios and Dance Schools.
18. All gambling establishments.

The above named establishments include both public and private owned and/or operated and as such are to comply with the curfew order.

EXEMPTIONS

Restaurants which are customarily open after midnight for the purpose of serving food may not be affected by the curfew order insofar as serving food is concerned. (The serving of alcoholic beverages and the operation of all entertainment devices and programs are to cease at 12 o'clock midnight.) Also exempt from the curfew order are the following types of establishments:

1. Entertainment for military and naval personnel which is sponsored by responsible agencies and conducted on a non-profit basis with the approval of the military and naval authorities in camps and stations, such as:

- a. United Service Organization units
 - b. Stage Door canteens.
- No other establishments as listed are to be exempt from the order.
