lem and bring back a recommendation at the next meeting. The committee named by President Moore is, Jerry Medcalf, chairman; George W. Martin, Art Drews, and A. E. Krieger. The committee held a short meeting and organized themselves and are going to get their job done in record time.

The next point of interest at the meeting was the suggestion that the chamber write a letter to the Federal Housing Agency asking for an inspector to investigate housing conditions in the valley with the view of getting priorities to build several new houses. The matter was acted upon and the letter, together with other letters from mills in the valley, will be sent.

Two changes in the by-laws were read and will be acted upon at the next meeting. One was asking that the executive committee be empowered to transact the business when not in session, and the other one was to make the annual dues \$1.00 for individual membership and \$3.00 for business institutions.

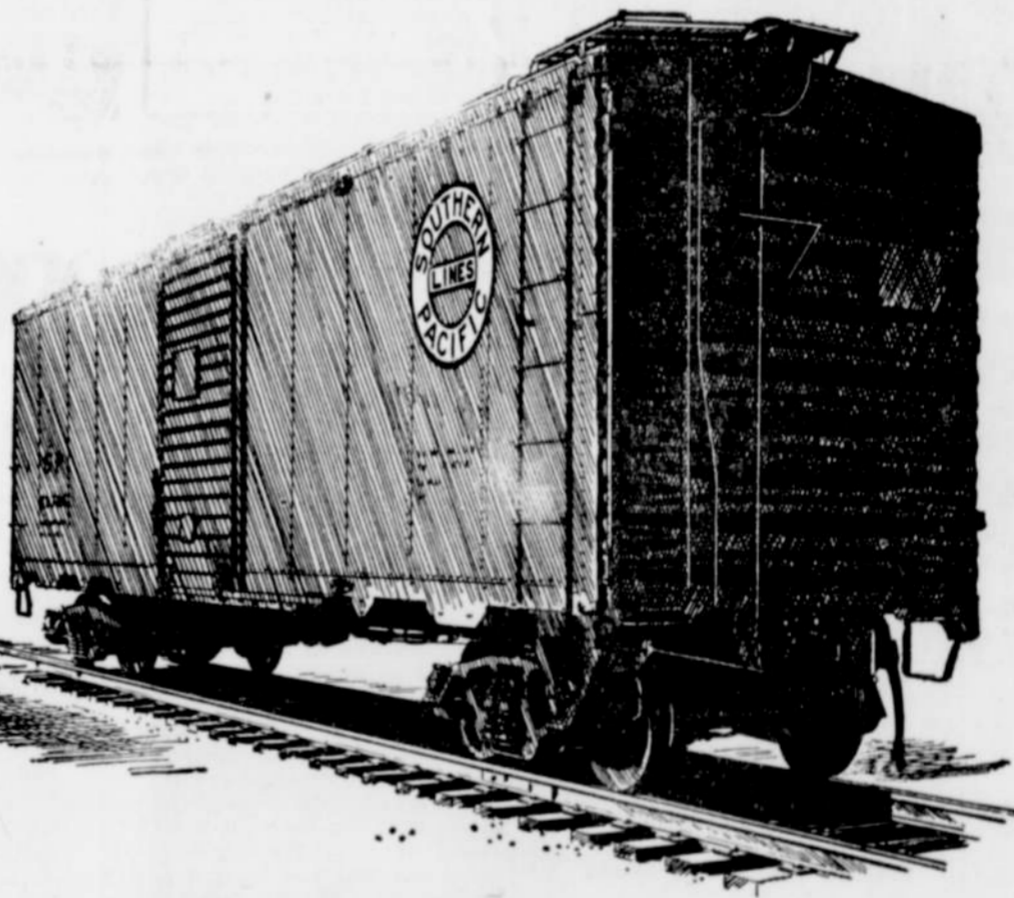
