Two of his observations stand out above all of the others. One was his description of the State Department operations throughout the world, with the conclusion that the United States is attempting to operate such offices too economically, and that our representation is not generally in keeping with our actual position in the world. The other part of his report which impressed me was his description of UNRRA. He found inefficiency and mismanagement prevalent in this important relief organization. He told Congress, "It is my

settled conviction that it is imperative for Congress to review and re-explore that whole operation. I have a lot of facts in my notebook which I could relate, but I will only give it to you as my considered judgment that it (UNRRA) is not doing the job which we intended."

Almost immediately following Dirksen's report, the President had a conference with former President Herbert Hoover. Mr. Hoover has had more experience in international relief administration than any other living man. His knowledge and background have never been utilized during the war emergency. A great many people here in Washington, and I am one of them, hope that Herbert Hoover's knowledge, experience and ability will be put to use.

Illinois Valley Croft Lily Bulbs Bring Returns

The story that has been spread on the coast regarding Croft lily bulbs raised in the valley, received a sound reprimand this week, when growers from Brookings came over to buy clean, disease-free bulbs from valley growers.

Also it was reported this week that H. C. Leming, the valley's largest bulb grower, sold 5 pounds of bulbs for \$500.00. This is a very low price for this class of bulbs, but Mr. Leming sold them to a new grower to help him get started.

Lily plants in the valley are looking exceedingly good, and those who know who have seen them, say they are "tops" as far as plants go.

One man interested asked permission to dig up a plant to inspect the bulbs and the condition of the large bulb. He was agreeably surprised to find the

bulbets very numerous and all exceedingly healthy.

More growers from the coast will come to the valley in the future for planting stock, and some are dickering for good bulb land. Plants are now budding, and some have as many as eight buds on a stem. The blooms are going to be very beautiful.
