everyone with the possible exception of General Eisenhower himself. I had the good fortune to spend some time with him last fall in Paris, and know him to be a very unassuming man, and a person who obviously does not care for this sort of thing. General Eisenhower is a great man and a great commanding general. His feat in leading our armies to a complete victory over Germany in exactly eleven months is the greatest military achievement in all history. There have been other great military victories, but none with operations conducted on such a vast scale or under more difficult conditions. Great as this achievement was, I think the fact that General Eisenhower was able to win victory with such a relatively small loss of men, considering the millions

involved, is the thing for which he should be honored most. Victory at a high price is still victory but victory as won by General Eisenhower and his armies with an absolute minimum loss of life is sweet indeed.
