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HAS YOUR AGRICULTURAL ENTERPRISE BEEN ENUMERATED?

The gathering of census information from the farms of this county will be completed late this month, according to Paul N. Plank, who has written to this paper.

However, there will undoubtedly be some farms that will be missed and it is the desire of the enumerators to cover every farm. Therefore, any farmer who has not been contacted on the census is urged to fill out the form below, if you are not certain that your farm has been covered.

(All general farms; also enterprises or establishments—even though small in area—such as greenhouses, mushroom cellars, nurseries, hatcheries, keeping of cows or other livestock, chickens and other poultry, or bees, or growing of flowers, vegetables or fruit, the value of the products from which sources amounted to \$250* or more in 1944).

If not, or if you have any doubt, fill out this blank and mail to Paul N. Plank, Supervisor of Census, Room 218, Lumbermen's Exchange Building, Eugene, Oregon.

*The \$250 limitation does not apply when the enterprise has three or more acres.

THE CHAOS IN A STARVING EUROPE CANNOT BE QUARANTINED

In a report to President Truman on the League's campaign, Anna Lord Strauss, national president of the League of Women Voters stated:

"The end of the European war brings us face to face with this hard fact: if steps are not immediately taken to prevent starvation in Europe there is a real possibility of an upsurge of fascism, the very thing which we have just said so great a price to destroy. The League of Women Voters believes that it is essential that our government do two things at once:

1. Improve insofar as possible the machinery for price control, rationing, and good management within this country so there will be fair distribution of the available supply.

2. So manage our rationing policy that we may share with liberated Europe our relative abundance."

Rationing of Food More Imperative Than Ever!

OPA Must Be Maintained But Strengthened!
Argument

Objection: The meat shortage in some areas and the widespread evidence of black market are combining to create a loss of public faith in and support for the rationing and price control program.

Answer: It is true that our system has not been adequate. However, it is now much too late to set

up a whole new system. The only possible course is to bolster the one we have whatever its faults, and make it work. This requires more cooperation from every citizen rather than less.

Solution: Pressure on Congress to renew the Price Control Act without crippling amendments. Write your congressman to this effect. NOW!

Alternative

If the price control breaks down we may well be paying \$1.50 per pound for meat. If there were no meat rationing, not only would those early at the grocery store get it all, but there would be no margin for supplying food to liberated Europe.

The chaos and anarchy which will follow prolonged hunger in the European countries could result in a new Fascism. V-E day has not brought the dawn of Democracy in Europe. It has brought only the opportunity to work against great odds to establish it. We should not allow hunger to increase such odds.

The public does not yet realize that we, the only sizeable island of order and plenty in a devastated world, far from "playing Santa Claus" have not yet supplied, for example, a single pound of meat for UNRRA.

Dance next Wednesday, July 4th, at the American Legion hall. Good music by local orchestra. Midnight eats. Make it a date.

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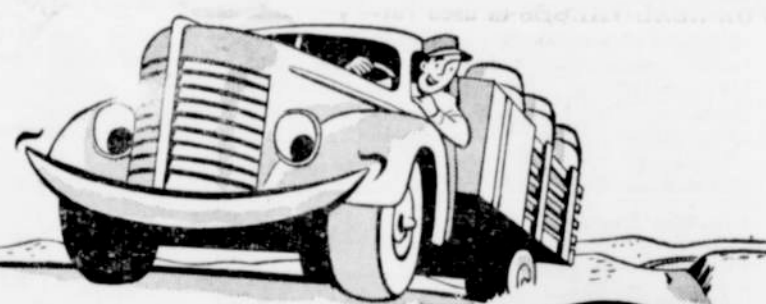
