AAA BOOSTS LUMBER QUOTA

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—A quota of eight million board feet of lumber for farm construction, maintenance and repair has been granted to Oregon for July, August and September, N. C. Donaldson, executive assistant to the state AAA committee, has reported. The allocation will not be enough to care for all farm needs, even though it is slightly larger than that of the previous three months, Donaldson said.

The lumber is distributed for essential farm uses on AA-2 and

AA-3 preference rating certificates issued by county AAA committees. Except for emergency construction to replace farm houses destroyed by fire, no certificates can be issued for lumber to be used in construction or remodeling of farm dwellings.
