Hospital Needs

year. Tuberculous cases require about two beds per year for 1000 population, and mental cases about six beds per year.

On the basis of a population of

16,000 for the county we may theoretically estimate that the present 62 beds would meet the immediate needs, but the hospital has to serve more than just the population of Josephine county. The proof of inadequate housing facilities of the hospital comes from the fact that it has been over-crowded.

Hospital service associations, similar to the Josephine County Health Protective Association, make the demand for hospital service greater, although just how much is not established by figures as yet. Apparently it will at least double the demand for the population holding service memberships.

What is the immediate problem at Josephine General Hospital?

The main problem is due to the fact that there are only 55 beds available for general hospital use. Two beds must be reserved for isolation cases of communicable diseases, and the 12 beds in the annex are only a make-shift.

The average occupancy as recorded in the official American Hospital Association records show the occupancy of 48 beds per day for 1943-44 at Josephine General Hospital. Forty-eight beds out of 55 means 87 per cent occupancy, and since this date the hospital has been just as crowded. Eighty per cent occupancy is considered high for a general hospital.

The people of Josephine County will need to consider the planning for more hospital bed space. For the future, it is safe to consider five beds for 1000 population in the hospital service area. It is
