board met Thursday evening at the Jerome Prairie school where they inspected the new school building and gymnasium before convening the meeting, said Mrs. Noble D. Stanton, clerk of the board.

Plans for a kitchen to be built at the Kerby high school were approved. The kitchen will be added to the building, only roughed-in at present and finished later due to a present lack of funds to complete it. Mrs. Sara Wertz, home economics teacher at Kerby high school, submitted the plans at the request of the directors, and William Laing, Medford architect who prepared plans for the Jerome Prairie and Kerby schools now under construction, made blueprints of the plans.

Bids for hardware for the two schools under construction were opened, but as only one bid had been submitted, the directors voted to buy the hardware wherever it could be located.

They decided to install forced ventilation in the kitchen at the Jerome Prairie school, and to have a hood built over the range to trap fumes. They further decided to eliminate a series of risers for seats in the gymnasium so that the

entire floor will be left unobstructed and can be used for two complete volley ball courts.

Bills for the past month, totaling about \$34,000 were approved. These included salaries, transportation to School District No. 7 and other items as well as the third bill from E. R. Sergeant, contractor on the Jerome Prairie and Kerby schools, for construction completed during December. Sergeant's bills were \$3,508.91 for the Kerby school and \$10,422.89 for the Jerome Prairie school.

Mrs. Harry W. Elroy was hired as assistant janitor at Kerby high school for the rest of the school year. Her husband is janitor there.

Tompkins to Head Drive for Funds

C. E. Tompkins has been named county chairman of the drive for funds in the fight against infantile paralysis, it was announced by Dr. S. B. Osgood, chairman of the Josephine County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Tompkins' duties will include those of general chairman in charge of "The March of Dimes," scheduled for January 14 through January 31, the President's birthday ball, and solicitation for the fund.
