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### MAN FROM THE WEST

It's no secret that Henry Kaiser, the Paul Bunyan of Western industry, is not the fair-haired boy to the eastern industrial giants.

And the reason is not hard to guess.

It has been both galling and appalling to leading industrialists on the other side of the Continent to see the way this newcomer to the "big time" has been outmaneuvering them in his bid for a prominent place in the automobile world.

Of course, in spite of the enthusiastic reception given both of his new cars by the public, he is by no means certain of victory as yet. The Big Three of the auto industry are going to fight tooth and nail to prevent him from cutting in seriously on their field. But he has already completed several important steps in that direction.

One of these steps was the raising of \$54 million in capital to finance his automobile venture. It was remarkable enough that he could acquire that much money from the public before a single car had rolled off the Willow Run assembly line. But the rush to buy his stock indicates how completely he has caught the imagination of the American people.

It has been impartially predicted that if his new cars do not develop any major faults in the first six months after they get on the road in substantial numbers he will be definitely "in." Regardless of how the industrial moguls feel, there are millions of Americans (besides his stockholders) who earnestly hope that his machines will be successful.

Well, with the miracles he has performed in shipbuilding, cement production, steel and other lines he is no novice at doing the "impossible."

this substitute bill was passed by a vote of two to one.

As this letter is written, there is before the House a revised version of the President's recommendation for the creation of fact-finding boards for the purpose of aiding in the settlement of labor disputes. In its present form, this bill is innocuous, and, in my opinion, would be of little constructive value if passed. Again, rather than passively vote "yes" or "no" on an inadequate Administration proposal, Republicans undoubtedly will swing in behind a bill introduced by Republican Representative Francis Case of South Dakota, which is offered as a substitute.

The Case Bill has been carefully written and is painstakingly designed to correct some of the inequities in present laws, and to provide exhaustive means of negotiation to be gone through prior to the actual calling of a strike. Here are two paragraphs from the first section of the Case Bill, which state its objectives:

"To aid in the voluntary and expeditious settlement of labor disputes affecting the public interest, therefore, there are hereby established additional facilities and procedures for the application of collective bargaining, conciliation, mediation, and arbitration.

"The desired end of bargaining between management and labor is a contract. Once that contract is made, it must be equally binding and enforceable on both parties. Free collective bargaining and contracts resulting therefrom must not be nullified or destroyed by resort on either side to willful violence or unlawful possession, obstruction, or destruction of property. Collective bargaining requires that labor be on one side of the table and management on the other. The separate positions, responsibilities, duties, powers, and rights of labor and management must be maintained."

It is obvious that the Case bill will be violently opposed by labor leaders, but it is the obligation of Congress, I think, to legislate for all of the people and not just for powerful labor leaders. In other words, I believe the best interests of all of the people, union members included, will be served by passage of legislation embodying the principles set out in the two paragraphs quoted above. In support of this opinion, I can quote from a book written by one of the greatest Liberals of all times, the late Mr. Justice Brandeis, who said:

"This practical immunity of unions from legal liability is deemed by many labor leaders a great advantage. To me it appears to be just the reverse. It tends to make officers and members reckless and lawless, and thereby to alienate public sympathy and bring failure upon their efforts. It creates on the part of the employers, also a bitter antagonism, not so much on account of lawless acts as from a deep-rooted sense of injustice, arising from the feeling that while the employer is subject to law, the union holds a position of legal irresponsibility."

### Two Teachers Needed For Kerby Grade School

Two additional elementary teachers for the Kerby Grade school will be hired by the Josephine County Board as soon as the board can find the teachers. It was decided at a meeting Thursday evening.

The new instructors will be employed to relieve the heavy load now carried in the first and fourth grades. Miss Pearle Griswold has 43 pupils in the first grade, with the classroom in the Assembly of God church at Kerby. Mrs. Blanche E. Robinson has 52 pupils in the fourth grade, using the classroom in the Selma school.

The board will also have to locate classrooms for the new instructors and their pupils.

### County Court Petitions For Timber

Aimed at tapping the largest remaining stand of timber in Josephine county, the county court will petition for inclusion of the Happy Camp road within the Forest Service system of highways it was announced Tuesday by Judge W. A. Johnson and Commissioner L. M. Mitchell.

The officials explained that the county has no funds with which to improve this road to the point where it could be used for hauling logs from the rich stands of ripe fir on government owned property tapped by the Happy Camp road. They felt however, that such improvement could be accomplished by having the road taken into the forest service highway system.

The decision was reached Monday when the court met with a committee from the Grants Pass Chamber of Commerce and with H. C. Obye, supervisor of the Siskiyou National Forest. Obye offered advice on the procedure for petitioning for inclusion of the road within the forest service highway system.

Improvement by widening and straightening the Happy Camp road would permit sale of a vast stand of timber now ready for market in that area, it was explained by Commissioner Mitchell and C. W. Thornberry, manager of the Chamber of Commerce. Most of this timber is fir, with some cedar and pine.

Representing the Chamber of Commerce at the meeting were C. H. Demaray, D. G. McGregor, F. I. Bristol and Thornberry.

The petitions will be addressed to the state highway commission, the regional U. S. forester at Portland, and the federal public roads commission at Portland.

### County School Survey To Determine Needs For Next Term Made

A survey of all county schools to determine repairs, additions, equipment or supplies that will be needed before the 1946-47 school year begins next fall, is being conducted by L. C. Moffitt, county school superintendent.

In a letter to all members of local school board sub-committees, Moffitt asked for information on needed maintenance, painting, playground improvements, school equipment or supplies that will be needed. He further requested that the board members submit a similar list of such items that are needed but which can wait for a year or so.

Moffitt suggested that the board members consult their teachers, cooks, janitors before making the list and stated that at a later meeting, the sub-committee board members would be invited to attend a special meeting of the Josephine county school board to discuss all suggestions received.
