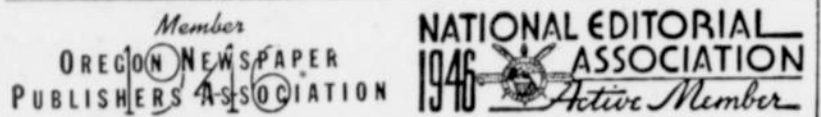

Among the hundreds of them that were around the ship, there wasn't one of them that had a pair of shoes; their clothes are torn and so darn filthy, I'm sure you wouldn't wear them to feed the chickens. But all kidding aside, they were really pitiful to look at, especially the little kids. The weather out here is about the same as it is around home at this time of year, but of course more damp, with a lot of fog.

Oh yes, before I forget; I might add this for you to think about: there was an old lady came aboard the ship and insisted on seeing the Captain, until the Captain finally came to see what the trouble was. She talked to him for quite some time, then the Captain had me write up the following for her (which she called her contract):

To Whom It May Concern:

Ah Soo (affectionately called "Mary") is hereby contracted to handle our garbage and do side

cleaning during such period as her services are found satisfactory.

Now let me break that down a bit for you Dutch. provement program which faces the county at present.

H. C. Obye, supervisor of Siskiyou National Forest, said Saturday that "we still want a higher standard of road in order to develop the lumber and mineral resources in that area and we are not giving up. The road can be either a forest highway or a higher standard forest road, if our department will permit us to build a better one."

Frankland's letter to Judge Johnson stated that since most of

the Happy Camp road is in California, the forest service's Region 5 will be notified of developments. Frankland's letter said that the Pacific Region, with Region 5, will make a joint inspection of the road project during the coming field season to get current information on the economic phases of the project.

The State Highway engineer's report was based, according to a copy of Baldock's letter which Frankland inclosed with his letter to Johnson, on two trips made over the Happy Camp road by his department before the war. At that time it was stated in his letter to Frankland, the state highway department found that the annual benefits on the first five and one-half miles of the road would be just one-third of the annual cost, which would "appear to be a poor investment."

Baldock's letter stated that taxes would not bring more than five per cent of the money that would be needed for the improvements. He said further that the road traverses a 5,600-foot summit and in his opinion the road was not worthy of improvement.

Baldock stated that there are many other roads on which the "forest dollars" could be expended and that on these other roads the public would receive benefits of two and three times the annual cost.
