entire dairy industry is shrinking at an alarming rate—that shortages of butter and other dairy products will become greater. They blame OPA mismanagement and subsidies for this condition.

FUTURE OF OPA

Sentiment against OPA seems to be building up. The argument for doing away with OPA runs something like this: "The war is over. We must get rid of these controls some time—why not do it now and be done with it?" But the sudden ending of controls with supplies of consumer goods far below normal would be a drastic and dangerous step. I hope a formula for the rapid "self-liquidation" of OPA will be written into the extension law. We should direct OPA to remove controls a step at a time—and rapidly, until all are gone.

FEED REDUCTION

Oregon poultry and livestock producers will be directly affected by the Department of Agriculture's recently announced wheat conservation order. The order as issued limits the use of wheat in feeds to the following percentages of wheat used in December 1945 and January 1946: February and March, 75%; April, 70%; May, 65%; June and months thereafter, 60%. A farmer may use without limit any wheat produced on his own farm.

Due to the lack of substitute grains in Oregon, I urged the Department of Agriculture to provide in the order some system of distribution of coarser grains to replace wheat in feeds. Since the order made no such provision, I have discussed the matter further with Department officials urging distribution which will give Oregon a fair share of the available feed supply. Officials indicated that they were trying to find a way to do this but had no plan at present.

Protein meal available to Oregon during February should be about 80% of the amount used in February 1945 according to the Department estimates. Through normal business channels the State will get 76% of the February 1945 quantities with an additional 591 tons from the government "set-aside."

On March 25, 1946, at the polling place in Cave City Precinct, Josephine County, Oregon, an election will be held from eight (8) o'clock A. M. till eight (8) o'clock P. M., for the purpose of submitting the following proposition to the legal voters residing inside the boundaries described in the proposition:

"Shall that portion of Josephine County, Oregon, described as: Beginning at a point on the East fork of the Illinois River on the Quarter section line running North and South through the center of Section 21, run thence North along the said quarter section line to the center of Section 16, thence East along the center line running East and West through Section 16, to the old Crescent City road in Section 15, thence in a Southerly direction along the West boundary line of the old Crescent City road to a point which is 300 feet North of the present Oregon Caves Highway, thence Easterly and parallel with the said Oregon Caves Highway to a point on the section line between Sections 26 and 27, thence South 300 feet to the center of the said Oregon Caves Highway, thence continuing South 300 feet from the center line of said highway, thence in a Northwesterly direction and parallel with the said Oregon Caves Highway to a point which is 300 feet East of the old Crescent City road, thence Southwesterly and parallel with the old Crescent City road to the East Fork of the Illinois River, thence in a Northwesterly direction along the North bank of the Illinois River to the point of beginning, all in Township 39 South, Range 8 West of the Willamette Meridian, in Josephine County, Oregon,
