Horn Ben D. Spaulding led his band of Oregon Cavemen to the Caves for their annual pilgrimage to the homesite of their forebears.

In spite of strikes, shut downs and closures, in spite of conversion and shortages, all forecasts of tourist travel for the summer point to a sharp incline in the ever-increasing number of sightseers who tour the west each summer. The Oregon Caves Resort company has done its best to be prepared for this increase, and already reservations have been received at the chateau for months in advance.

Seasonal records for visitors have already been shattered at the Caves by tourists who could not wait for the chateau accommodations. A week ago Sunday 345 visitors were ushered through the Marble Halls of Oregon.

The Resort company is owned and operated by a group of Grants Pass business men who have built the picturesque and spacious chateau, the new chalet, the guest houses and cabins, and the many other accommodations. The chalet itself will be used this year for the first time. It was completed in 1941, not in time to be used before all the resort except the Caves themselves was closed for the duration.

The chalet will be the dormitory for women employees of the resort company. In it will be the dressing rooms where tourists will don the protective uniforms furnished to those who tour the caverns.

Manager for the resort company is Harold Say, who gave up his position as head of the travel and information bureau for the Oregon State Highway department to accept the Caves position.

the salaries of cooks for school lunches was subtracted with the thought that Parent-Teacher Associations would step into the breach to keep the lunches going (the \$9,000 originally budgeted for lunch room equipment was left in the new budget in order to outfit and complete the lunch facilities at Kerby, Jerome Prairie, and other schools where more equipment is needed, thus provid-

ing the means for P-T. As to prepare the lunches; and \$5,000, the price of one new bus, was taken from the \$23,000 item for repair and replacement of buses.

Other savings: \$1500 was removed from legal services, leaving \$750; \$1040 was taken from stenographers, under the supervision section, leaving \$960; \$1000 was taken from the textbooks item, leaving \$2000; \$4000 was taken from the insurance item, leaving \$6000. There were also smaller reductions in other items.

The \$80,700 added to the capital outlays division of the budget was divided as follows: \$35,000 to complete the Kerby school, \$15,700 to complete the Jerome Prairie school, \$7500 to buy desks and other furniture, and \$22,500 to build two new classrooms and additional ground at Fruitdale.

OREGON LOWERS POULTRY NUMBERS BEYOND QUOTA

Latest reports on chick hatchings and poultry numbers as reviewed by the O. S. C. Extension service reveal that Oregon has made a greater reduction in numbers than the coast states as a group and other leading poultry sections.

Commercial hatchings of chicks in Oregon in April were only 80 percent of a year ago compared with 83 percent for the coast as a whole and an increase of 8 percent for the north central states. Washington and Idaho also show April increases.

A special May 1 government turkey report showed that Oregon turkey raisers will make at least a 35 percent decrease in numbers raised this year compared to last, with a national reduction of only 15 percent. Oregon's goal was 15 percent reduction.

Cold storage holdings of turkeys May 1 were about four times the
