



LOUISIANA OIL DISCOVERY BIGGEST SINCE TEXAS FIND

Sun Oil Company's discovery of the Delhi field in Richland Parish, Louisiana, has proven to be the biggest oil find of its type since discovery of the giant East Texas field in 1930, John G. Pew, assistant to the vice president of Sun, said.

He expressed belief many more such fields remain to be discovered in the United States.

Recent surveys of the Delhi field, located in December, 1944, indicate it will produce at least 175,000,000 barrels of oil. Only a score of the nation's most important oil fields have produced to date as much as 200,000,000 barrels. The East Texas field has yielded approximately 2,000,000,000 barrels, and is estimated to have at least that much more in reserve.

Delhi production currently is 16,000 barrels daily. Since the discovery well, 219 additional wells have been drilled in the field.

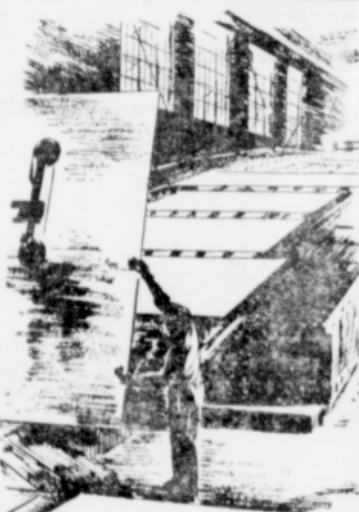
Cattle Tests Required For Fair Showing

All dairymen, contemplating showing cattle or beef stock returned as breeders, at the county fair, are urged by County Agent Jens F. Svith to have them tested immediately for tuberculosis and Bang's disease.

The state law requires such test within 3 days of beginning of the fair, Svith said, in urging raisers to contact their veterinarian's at once.

FUNDS INCREASED TO HELP SUPPORT PMA CONSERATION

An additional \$140,650 has been made available for assisting Oregon farmers and ranchers with soil and water conserving practices under the 1946 agricultural conservation program, it has been announced by E. Harvey Miller, chairman of the state PMA committee.

Oregon's share of the funds provided by Congress for conservation practice payments to farmers in 1946 has been increased to \$2,953,650 as compared with the original allocation at the start of the year of \$2,813,000.

Miller said that the additional funds will be allocated to counties whose original allocations are not sufficient to cover all of the conservation work for which farmers have requested assistance. He indicated that county agricultural conservation committees will be asked to use the extra funds to increase minimum farm allowances on farms where the most conservation can be obtained.

The operators of some 33,500 Oregon farms have filed farm plans requesting practice payment assistance amounting to more than \$5,000,000, Miller reported. County committees currently are asking operators to report any changes in the intended practices listed on the farm plans, which were made out last spring.

"Farmers who find that they will not be able to carry out some of the practices for which they requested assistance are urged to amend their farm plans accordingly," Miller said. "This will release funds for conservation work on other farms."

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
