HOUSING LACK AT ALL BUT 2 ORE. COLLEGES

Several Oregon colleges this fall will accept new students, but only two of them—Vanport and Monmouth's Oregon College of Education—have adequate housing facilities, reports received by Edward T. Taggart, educational officer for the state Department of Veterans' Affairs, disclosed this week.

At the same time Taggart urged World War II veterans planning to use the \$35 a month Oregon school aids benefits this fall to apply now, either at their schools or through their county service officers or the Salem or Portland offices of the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

Brightest outlook on the college housing front is at Vanport, where officials reported to Taggart that 2000 housing units will be made available for veterans only, in lower-division studies, but they said applications should be made now in order to get the units into shape. One thousand each of single and married veterans can be accommodated, they said.

Oregon College of Education at Monmouth reported housing available, and lower-division class openings, for about 300 veterans, including 35 married students. Both Vanport's and Monmouth's studies are integrated to meet lower-division requirements of University of Oregon and Oregon State.

University of Portland can provide studies for 155 students above the freshman level, but has housing for 55 women students only.

The following have class openings, but no housing: Marylhurst, near Oswego, for 50 women in all subjects; Multnomah, Portland, refrigeration, radio and aircraft mechanics Pacific University, Forest Grove, subjects other than optometry, which is full.

Taggart said students wanting state educational benefits should get their eligibility forms filled out, and their applications filled out and signed by the institution they plan to attend, and get them into the Department of Veterans' Affairs, State Library Building, Salem. These two forms should be sent in along with a certified or photostatic copy of the man's discharge, he said.

UNSAFE CARS FILL HIGHWAYS, POLICE FIND

EVANSTON, Ill.—The International Association of Chiefs of Police reports police departments in nearly every city and town in the United States and Canada, checking four weeks said one-third of the cars examined failed to meet even minimum standards.

Rear lights, front lights and brakes accounted for most of the failures. Except for a few parts shortages, the dangers were a direct result of carelessness on the part of the drivers, the police reported.

"Motorists who continue to operate unsafe vehicles will account for a large share of the traffic deaths which will occur this summer," Robert E. Raleigh, associate director of the traffic division of the police association, said.

"Our safety check program proves that motorists are driving old vehicles which they do not, or cannot, keep in condition. Neglect of safety equipment is criminal," he said.

Lack of Sugar Saves Teeth

CLEVELAND, O.—Dr. Schour speaking to the Cleveland Dental Society reported findings of a trip he made to Italy. He said the complete absence of sugar among Italy's under-nourished people resulted in a low incidence of dental decay.

"This shows that dental decay is primarily a dietary rather than a nutritional problem," he said. "People in this country would do well to avoid excesses in sugar consumption."

The doctor said if tooth brushing is to be effective it must be done immediately after each meal.

"An hour later the harm is done," he said, adding that "fermentable carbohydrates form tooth-destroying acids swiftly in the mouth."
