Pine Waste Makes Good
Product; Method Sought

Ponderosa pine waste from
eastern Oregon produces an excel-
lent fiber for making hardboard,
according to experiments carried
on in the Oregon Forest Products
laboratory at the Oregon State
College at the request of the
Lakeview Chamber of Commerce.
The experiments were conducted
by Robert D. Graham, a graduate
student, under the direction of
staff members.

While the hardboard, produced
by grinding the wood to pulp and
forming it in a hydraulic press,
is of excellent quality, the pro-
cess is not considered commer-
cially feasible until efficient op-
erations on a smaller scale than
those now used are developed,
says Paul M. Dunn, dean of for-
estry and director of the labora-
tory.

A 50-ton per day plant is the
minimum size that can be op-
erated efficiently with existing pro-
cesses, says Dean Dunn. This
amounts to about 33 cords of slab
wood per day and requires a plant
investment of at least one mil-
lion dollars.

To be effective in waste utili-
zation at a fairly large mill or to
serve a group of smaller mills, a
process is needed that will be ef-
ficient at a 20-ton daily capacity
with a capital outlay of about
one-fourth of present minimum
costs. The laboratory staff feels
there are good possibilities of de-
veloping such a process working
in the new industrial research
building here if funds continue
available.

The work done by Graham
showed that the best and most at-
tractive hardboard was made by
using the pine with bark on and
pressing it to 500 pounds per
square inch without refining. That
made with the bark left on was
stronger, more resistant to water,
and had an attractive appearance
with dark brown flakes against a
lighter base.

The laboratory already had ex-
tensive studies under way using
Douglas fir and lodgepole pine.
