N. Y. Economist Sees Mild Shakeup for 1948

"Prices can't go much above present levels" is the optimistic prediction of Dr. Marcus Nadler of New York, professor of economics at New York University, stated in an interview in Portland. At the same time, speaking with recognized authority, he added: "On an average, 40 per cent of workers' wages go for food and 20 per cent for rent, leaving only 40 per cent for services, durable and soft goods."

The average annual workers' wage is approximately \$2500. According to the percentages set out by Dr. Nadler, which incidentally are in line with statistics of other research economists, the \$2500 worker, head of a family of four, would pay \$1000 of his total wages for food. He would pay \$500 for rent and so would have \$1000 remaining for general expenses.

Under the sales tax he would pay no tax for food, nor rent. He would pay no tax on physician's or dentist's services, hospital service, insurance, transportation, hotel, motor court, entertainment, recreation or other services. He would pay the 3 per cent tax on meals in restaurants, on clothes and shoes and luxury items.

The way it figures out, the \$2500 a year man, would pay an income tax of \$17.65 should the sales tax fail; but no income tax should the sales tax be approved. His sales tax would be \$17, while the tax on his home would be reduced by from 8 to 20 mills according to the assessed valuations of his city and county.

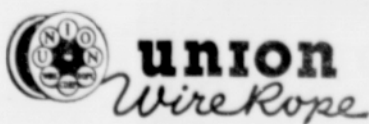
