World War II Veterans

Partially disabled World War I veterans who were wounded in combat have until December 31 to reenlist in the regular army or army air forces in the same grade held at discharge, district army officials informed the state department of Veterans' Affairs today.

Lt. Col. F. C. Dahlquist, commanding officer of the Oregon district army and air force recruiting service, said all applications for reenlistment under this program which are in progress by December 31 will be covered by the deadline.

Reenlistment in the same grade applies to those who were discharged from the enlisted ranks. Former commissioned officers, warrant officers and flight officers will be reenlisted in grade one.

Ex-servicemen have their choice

of enlisting for three, four or five years, Col. Dahlquist said.

Applicants for reenlistment under the combat-wounded program will be sent to Fort Lewis or McCord Field for physical examinations to determine fitness for active service.

Despite the amount of disability incurred as the result of combat, if the veteran can perform certain "occupational" duties such as clerical work for which he is trained or partially trained, he has a good chance of being accepted, according to Col Dahlquist.

Veterans receiving compensation for disabilities were cautioned that this pay will be "suspended" by the Veterans Administration during the time of enlistment. Those interested were advised to apply at any one of Oregon's 14 main and 14 sub-recruiting stations.

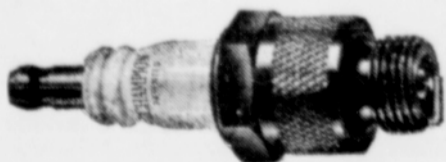

5 TONS CHARCOAL TO BE PRODUCED FOR LARGE TESTS

Arrangements to produce five tons of charcoal from sawdust in its experimental retort at Oregon State college have been completed by the Oregon Forest Products laboratory, announced Dr. Phimister B. Proctor, technical director. The charcoal will be used for commercial tests by several companies contemplating establishing industries in the Pacific northwest.

The companies concerned are interested in the possibility of utilizing charcoal made from sawdust in electric furnace applications, and in using charcoal fines — a sifted form — in the production of industrial carbides. There is also interest in utilization of wood tars that are produced as by-products of charcoal making, says Dr. Proctor.

Small-scale tests of sawdust charcoal conducted by the U. S. bureau of mines and the Carborundum company have already proved successful. Success with large-scale test runs made possible with the five tons to be produced at the laboratory would probably lead to construction soon of the college which has previously been considered.

This pilot plant is to be used to produce even larger quantities of charcoal for further tests, and to obtain cost data and technical information necessary for the engineering of commercial scale plants.

Cooperating with the forest products laboratory in this project are several companies directly concerned, the lumber industry, the school of forestry and the Bonneville Power administration. The latter agency has participated in the charcoal project for several years, being interested in the regional problem of supplying industrial carbon for electroprocess developments making use of hydro-electric power.

Large scale use of charcoal made from sawdust would also bring far-reaching benefits to the forest economy of the northwest, Dr. Proctor adds, as sawdust, unlike hogged or chipped wood, has very few uses at present.

Tenderize the Corn

A corn kernel cutter to "tenderize" the corn on the cob before consumption has been patented. An arch-shaped handle and plate, fitted with a series of blades, reportedly does the trick. When drawn along an ear of corn it splits the kernels.
