COPCO REPORTS ON GROSS REVENUES

The California Oregon Power Company reports gross operating revenues for the twelve months ending April 30, 1948, of \$8,087,518, an increase of 13 per cent over revenues for the same period ending in 1947. Gross revenues for the month of April totaled \$700,402, an increase of 19 per cent over the same month of last year.

In releasing these figures A. S. Cominis, president of the company, stated that consumption of electricity by residential customers during the twelve months ending April of this year increased 26 per cent over the previous period and averaged 3,790.65 kilowatt-hours, at an average cost of 1.702 cents.
